HARC Field Day 2008 Safety & Environmental Plan 19 May 2008

HARC is required to provide a Safety Environmental Plan to Parks Canada this year since we are conducting our Field Day operations at a federal facility, York Redoubt.

Since the site is a public area, it is necessary to take extra steps to ensure the safety of any visitors to the site at all times, particularly during set up and tear down.

Other hazards, such as rf safety, electrical, tripping, elevated structures, wire, ropes, and fire must be minimized as much as reasonably possible.

Up to date emergency first aid response is also necessary.

The Safety Environmental Plan submitted to Parks Canada should include;

- identification of Safety Officers,
- on site personnel trained in CPR and first aid,
- up to date first aid kits on site,
- planned method for erecting, and securing the towers to maximize safety,
- identification of fall zones for erected structures
- what would be used for shelters,
- the use of propane BBQ,
- food preparation and storage,
- any other safety considerations,
- environmental issues such as fuel spill response.

There were a number of safety and environment issues identified during the 2006 field day weekend, most of which were dealt with in a timely manner and none of which interrupted the weekend operations.

Issues identified;

1.Designated Safety Officer

- Terry Bigelow VE1TRB
- Pat Kavanaugh VE1PHK
- Dave Charbonneau VE1DDC

2. First Aid and CPR

- The above three safety officers are qualified First Aid and at least one will be on site during set up and tear down operations.
- There will be a safety officer on side during visitor hours to administer first aid, and other club members that are able to administer first aid will cover quiet times.
- A first aid station will be set up in the tent, and will be equipped with a first aid kit.
- Consideration should be made for an eye wash station.
- In the event of an emergency, there will be people available with cell phones to summon help if there is a need.
- The first aid station is to be clearly identified using signage and the location of the first aid station is to be known by all on site.
- It is necessary to post who is available to administer First Aid & CPR at the first aid station.

3. Tower, Antenna, and RF Safety

- There is a requirement to identify "fall zones" around all towers to ensure tents and the general public are kept a safe distance.
- The safe distance is considered to be 50 feet from the base of guyed towers.
- Towers and elevated structures are to be raised in the safest method possible, with consideration of the number of people available to do the work. To avoid confusion and maximize safety, one person should be designated as foreman for raising and lowering towers.
- helmets are to be made available and used where there is a potential of falling objects.
- All low lying guy wires are to be clearly marked with fluorescent tape to at least 8 feet to ensure maximum visibility.
- All radiating wires are to be elevated at least 10 feet and clearly marked to ensure there will be no physical contact by visitors to the

site. With this in mind there should be no concerns about rf contact burns.

- All HF directional antennas will be erected well above ground, and VHF UHF directional antennas will normally be inclined above 90 degrees so as to minimize any rf radiation concerns.
- All wires and antenna that traverse any roadway or parking area must be elevated to a height of 14 feet and clearly marked with fluorescent tape to identify their presence to high sided emergency or service vehicles.
- When securing towers, ropes are to be secured with the possibility of vandalism in mind, particularly where rope is being extended outside the park, or through wall openings

4. Environmental concerns

Environmental stewardship is of growing concern and must be addressed proactively at - all times. With the use of fuels and lubricants we must be able to respond quickly to all situations.

- Portable generators are to be positioned and operated on a containment device such as a tarpaulin, in the event of a fuel or oil leaks or a spill.
- Fuelling of generators should be conducted employing two people so as to ensure full control of fuelling nozzles, and to quickly respond to any accident. Consideration should be made to use a "flow and go" type fuelling hand pump.
- Kitty litter or other absorbent material is to be on site for fuel or oil clean up if the need arises.

5. Fire Fighting Equipment

- The Search and Rescue Command Bus is equipped with ABC type extinguishers along with the portable repeater trailer.
- Appropriate Fire Fighting equipment such as ABC fire extinguishers to be made available when any generators are being fuelled, and when the BBQ is in operation.

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6. Other Safety concerns

Clearance requirements are to be adhered to when the BBQ is in use,

Proper handling and storage of food on site is to be considered

7. Conclusions

The Safety Officer position holds the responsibility to ensure and cause all reasonable safety and the environment concerns are dealt with in a timely manner. If safety or environmental are not being met, those we work with are entrusting us to stop work until we are satisfied concerns are addressed appropriately.

This report identifies a number of issues that were raised during field day 2006. The club executive and 2006 field day chair were to have reviewed and addressed these recommendations.

Improving the Down-East Flea Market

I was working my way through the April 2008 edition of *CQ* magazine recently and came across an article by Michael Crestohl – W1RC – entitled "*Keeping the Regional Hamfest Alive*". It was an interesting article, and while the advice for organizers of regional flea markets and hamfests was quite good, it was not by any means new – I have thinking myself for several years now about several of the tips he gave.

When I got into Ham radio in 1994 and attended my first flea market at Exhibition Park the lineup to get into the event seemed to go on forever, and once inside the building the place was absolutely packed with Hams eager to buy anything and everything. I would guess that the attendance that day exceeded seven hundred. Roll forward to 2007 and I doubt that there were more than 350 in attendance at the old Forum Annex. So why the decline? Clearly it is not that there are any fewer Hams in the region, in fact there are a lot more. But, many, like me, are that new breed of Ham who have come into the hobby without the technical expertise to build their own gear, or for that matter, the desire to do so. These new Hams are interested in buying good reliable used or preferably new gear, and when you look around at what is on many of the flea market tables, there is very little quality used equipment and little or no new gear because we have a hard time attracting commercial suppliers. The result is that fewer and fewer Hams attend the Down-East Flea Market – unless they simply want to come and socialize – and many more are logging on to the websites of the big commercial suppliers and ordering their new gear online.

So, how do we improve attendance at our Flea Market and at the same time provide a better experience overall for attendees?

Well, we might start by considering the implication of having the two big events that HARC sponsors – the DX Forum and the Down East Flea Market – occuring at different times of the year (except for this year when they are being held together as part of the 75th Hamfest celebrations). In case you have not noticed, the cost of travelling is getting to be very expensive. As a result, how likely is it that individuals will travel, say from NB or PEI, both in May for the Flea Market and again in August for the DX Forum? Not high I would guess and as the cost of gas increases the likelihood of this happening will be further reduced.

My suggestion then for improving the Flea Market is to make a commitment – at least for the next three years – to move it from the May slot where it has traditionally been held, to Saturday on the first weekend in August so that it can be co-located with the DX Forum that occurs on Friday. That way, participants would only have to make one trip to take in both events. And since this is the Natal Day weekend, visitors and locals alike would get an even bigger bang for the travelling bucks. I believe that commercial suppliers would also be much more willing to support us by attending these events if they knew that they were coming down form Ontario or Quebec for a concentrated weekend of Amateur Radio activity, and not just a three-hour flea market.

I gave notice of motion at the May HARC meeting to have the Flea Market moved as outlined above, and I would like to encourage you to think about the possibility of how such a move might improve the Down-East Flea Market and I would ask you to support the motion when it comes up for a vote at the June Club meeting.

REPORTS

Treasurer:

Fraser MacDougall, VE1WO, reported expenses totalling \$292.04, income of \$2,648.07 and a balance of \$13,750.18. See detailed copy attached.

Secretary: Helen, VE1HMR, reported that 2 more registrations for the 75th celebrations have been received for a total of 10 registered for the DX Form, 2 for the Far Side of Amateur Radio for a total to date of \$1,695.00. The QST magazine and mail for the QSL bureau have arrived. Quotes for branded products are in process and information will be posted in June's Reflector regarding golf shirt sizing so members can confirm sizing before placing orders. Sample will be available at the June meeting, Report attached.

President: Regrets

Past President: No Report

1st **Vice-President:** Murray, VE1MMD, stated that his report would be nested within agenda items.

2nd Vice-President: Murray, VE1MMD, advised that Tom, VE1 BMJ, is away. Larry Hicks, V01HL will be presenting software-defined radio later this evening. The door prize is a hat and LED light.

Director at large: No Report

Station Manager: Brian Allen, VE1AZV, reported that Jeremy Fowler, VE1JHF, is currently installing the club door locks upstairs. They will be completed tomorrow. PC access for Windows DX is available now and Barry Diggins, VE1TRI, will organize a training session for DX for Win. Murray added that two electronic latches were back-ordered and that contributed to the delay.

Committee reports:

Membership: Howard Dickson, VE1DHD, reported 4 life, 18 associate and 116 full memberships for a total of 137

<u>Callbook:</u> Howard Dickson, VE1DHD, reported that the Callbook is proceeding well and that the next major task is to add the main database Bill, VE1MR, is working on the database while travelling.

Howard expects the database will be received at the end of the week. The book goes to the printer mid-June and, at present, 254 pages are expected. The selling price will be \$15.00. Sales will begin at the Flea Market. Pre-orders are possible and clubs may pre-order through Fraser, who advised 178 books have been confirmed to date.

Flea Market 2009 and Beyond: Howard Dickson, VE1DHD, reported on an article read in the current QST magazine regarding heightening event attendance, which promotes marrying events to reduce travel time to enhance viability. When considering the Flea Markets in the future, Howard asks members to consider that this year's DX Forum and the Far Side of Amateur Radio, in conjunction with the Flea Market may indicate increased value for time and travel. We have an opportunity while completing the Callbook to capture such addedvalue for future through advertising, if we were to link the Flea Market with the DX forum in August next year. Given that the Callbook life will be ei-

ther 3 or 4 years, it becomes a venue for us to advertise club events. Howard recommends that for 2009, 10 and 11, that the Dx Forum and Flea Market be combined to create a mini-hamfest on the 1st w/end of August. It is possible HARC will develop other activities within that mix. Note that Natal Day, a civic holiday, adds a further attraction when considering a jaunt to Halifax. Scott, VE1QD, spoke of reactions encountered while attending the Dayton Hamfest, where he was promoting the Dx Forum. People liked the program (handout cards with program information listed) and the Flea Market combination. Amateurs from New England and Ontario with whom he spoke mentioned that they have been thinking of bringing family to Nova Scotia. Scott feels his experience represents a good response to marketing. Howard noted that we have had difficulty drawing vendors to the Flea Market, but that an expanded event will enhance the opportunity for vendors. Win, VE1WIN, stated that he has been advertising the events on the Gore Net and, also, through Percy's Trans-Canada Net. Noting that the Flea Market has always been a "Downeast" event, Fraser, VE1WO, reported that he has spoken with John Brady, VE1WZ, of the DARC, who indicated that DARC would support HARC in this venture.

Motion: THAT the HARC, in conjunction with DARC, hold the Down East Flea Market in the early part of August for the next 3 years - 2009, 2010 and 2011, in conjunction with the DX Forum and any other related activity.

Moved by: Howard, VE1DHD Seconded by Scott, VE1QD

<u>Discussion</u>: Clarification was wanted as to whether the date change is being suggested due to perceived needs of the Callbook, and/or, if members have had sufficient time to consider ramifications of such change.

Amendment to the motion: THAT a *Notice of Motion* be published in the June Reflector to be presented at the June general meeting. Motion Carried.

<u>Club Survey:</u>: Murray, VE1MMD, will process the information provided by members. In total there have been 88 valid returns, 3 with incorrect addresses and 1 unsigned – therefore – invalid completed questionnaire for a return of 55% of the members holding full membership.

QSL Bureau: Bureau Status: Tom Caithness, VE1GTC, reported that Murray, VE1MMD; Brian, VE1AZV, and he, with many other members offering assistance, have worked on establishing the on site QSL Bureau. Tom noted that he'd taken on the management of the bureau in June/July last year and that most of 2007 had been spent familiarizing himself with the data. To date, 6591 cards have come in 2008; 1400 were sent out over the week-end and 7421 have been given out. The database documents a total 19,378 cards, but this number is questioned due to glitches encountered. The bureau needs a person familiar with Dbase III to assist in the updating of the database program. Specific objectives include clearing out the backlog - cards remaining on site for amateurs having no money in their bureau account, or, who owe the bureau money for previous send-outs. The bureau is set up in the club's general office and maintains security by using a locked cabinet. Tom is negotiating with Wayne Catchpaugh, VE1TTT, to design an appropriate cabinet.

Bureau users: Tom stated that it is necessary to clarify who is a member of the bureau. Cards are arriving from newly licensed people with no reference on them. Tom asks that if members know of new hams on the air, that they are told to make contact with the club (Tom) and to send \$5 to hold on deposit. The bureau does require an account to be set up. Tom will send letters to those in default asking how they wish to deal with cards and, if necessary, obtain consent to destroy unwanted cards. He is also looking for a new database, as the current program, noting that Dbase III does not converse with Dbase V. The bureau's bank balance (on deposit) is \$4935.55. The bureau assigns a surcharge of \$.50 which goes towards general costs. Tom requests that hams that don't want to exchange OSL cards, tell other amateurs at the time of contact.

<u>Basic Course</u>: Barry Diggins, VE1TRI, asks that members think of prospective candidates for the course in the fall, which will start Sept 18th. Barry will ensure information on how to utilize the QSL Bureau is added to the program.

EMO: Dave George, VE1AJP, reported that there has now been a 15-year involvement of emergency communications with Capitol District Health. Currently

there are three radio kits installed in the QEII New Infirmary including portables, j-pole antennas and commercial radios ready for deployment, and three more in the Bethune Building. Those in the Bethune Building will be going into portable kits so there will be 6 kits available. Capitol Health certainly understands what the amateur community does and the contribution of amateurs during an emergency. There will be upcoming exercises that members will be advised of in the future.

Search and Rescue: Dave George, VE1AJP, reported that the new logistics bus would debut at the Field Day site. SAR has been testing new equipment resulting in good and not-so-good times. He related that one 16,500 watt generator would start and stop - that was fixed with a couple of alligator clips and it has been working fine since. SAR has raised money for maintenance during past 10 years by hosting bingo nights; however, after loosing the use of the Masonic Hall and relocating to Woodside, this has been a struggle. On the weekend, they ended all bingo operations having invested \$60,000 since August 2007 to get up and running at their new location but seeing no return on that investment. EMO increased their grant to SAR from \$1000 to \$3000 per team, which goes towards an operating budget of \$84,000. Amateur radio has always played a key role in SAR.

Field Day: Chairman John Bartlett, VE1OZ, reported that the Field Day Committee has been active and key team leaders are organizing their participation and volunteers. (See attached report). Terry, VE1TRB's Safety report will be posted in The Reflector. David, VE1EDA, will be out of town requiring an alternate person to ensure the EMO trailer arrives on site. Barry Diggins, VE1TRI, will submit an explanation of bonus points to The Reflector and Bill, VE1MR, will require volunteers to assist with scoring tabulation.

Status: There is 1 month and 10 days until Field Day. Team Leaders are carrying on in detail planning. John requested that e-mail notes be sent to keep him updated and permitting the compilation of written documentation of progress. John will be out of town, returning June 18th and will make a final report to the club at the June 27th meeting. He emphasized Dave George's reminder

that anything installed utilizing the SAR bus must be able to be removed within 30 minutes should the bus be needed to dispatch to a SAR site. Due to new tower design, planners must revisit the 6-meter antenna placement. Also, as learned at a recent EMO meeting, HRM is now bound by new health and safety requirements. Everything must be grounded, including the trailer. With an 8-foot ground rod recommended, specifications of requirements should be forwarded to John, who will distribute copies to the Team Leaders

<u>Work shifts</u>: Brian, VE1AVZ, stated that sign-up sheets are on the back table for hours of operation and places; members were asked to please sign up.

HARC/CRC: Herb Doane, VE1HTD CRC reiterated that the amateur radio group SARA was disbanded and reverted to being part of HARC and the equipment SARA had is now under HARC ownership. Herb's meeting yesterday with CRC was not satisfactory. It was quite clearly indicated that they do not want to sign a MOU with HARC and feel that any response to emergency would be through EMO for amateur operators if and when needed. The situation is still in flux. As of now, if CRC continue not to want to have an MOU it appears that the club will withdraw the equipment. This would include all the HF equipment, which will eliminate their HF capability.

Other: Terry, VE1TRB, reported that the MS Walk was well covered in The Reflector. He noted that the vests were perfect and will be used for the MS Bike Tour. Rick, VE1RGG, is coordinating the bike tour and has a team in place but could still use a couple of people. If interested, please contact Rick, ve1rgg@rac.ca. Terry noted that David, VE1EDA, won't be available to tow the trailer and that Rick is aware of that fact.

Old business:

Branded Product: Helen, VE1HMR, will submit golf shirt size measurements for posting in The Reflector and asks that members measure a favourite tee shirt before ordering so as not to be disappointed with fit. Orders will be taken in June, at which time the club will also determine exactly what branded product is wished to be available for HARC75 celebrations.

From the ARRL Newsletter, Vol. 27, No. 21 A Russian rocket launched from Plesetsk on May 23 carried a number of payloads to orbit, including a new Amateur Radio satellite named Yubileiny -- Russian for jubilee -- since christened Radio Sputnik 30 (RS-30). Operational details are vague at this time. Amateurs throughout the world report receiving signals at 435.315 and 435.215 MHz; some report reception of CW telemetry while others report what appear to be image transmissions from the satellite. RS-30 is orbiting at a maximum altitude of 1500 km, creating a substantial communications footprint below. The satellite will broadcast audio and video about the history of the Soviet and Russian space programs, as well as signals imitating those broadcast by Sputnik I in 1957. According to the satellite's launch team, "The motive for development of the Yubileiny small spacecraft was the 50th anniversary of the first space satellite. With the help of that satellite, the new space systems and equipment are expected to get flight qualification, and radio-amateurs all over the world will be able to receive information on the history of space development and domestic cosmonautics achievements."

Talk To The Machine

February 22, 2008: One of the unsung electronic heroes of the war on terror is the Phraselator. This is a (large) PDA size device that emits perfectly pronounced words and phrases when the user picks them from a list on the PDA screen, or speaks the English version into a microphone.

Phraselator has been around for a decade, and has been a lifesaver in Afghanistan and Iraq. The first models stored data on 64 megabyte Compact Flash memory cards. With those early versions, you plugged in the right memory card and you are ready to communicate in one of over 50 languages. Each memory card contained 500-1,000 phrases.

Since then, memory card capacity grew to hold a thousand times as much data, enabling all the languages to be stored in each \$2,500 Phraselator. Weighing about a pound, the Phraselator is heavy, but the battery will last over a week without a recharge. The voice recognition is pretty good if you speak clearly, and does not require any preparation by the user (like reciting a bunch of phrases so the computer can "recognize" your voice.) The phrases in the Phraselator mostly ask questions, which can be answered by yes/no, pointing somewhere, or doing something specific (as in, "put your hands up.") Civil Affairs troops like it, because they deal with people in a relaxed atmosphere where an American with yet another gadget will not produce more anxiety. Medical personnel also find Phraselator very useful.

There are special vocabulary sets in the Phraselator, like Force Protection (FP) and Medic, which make available appropriate terms in many languages like Korean, Dari (Eastern Farsi), Pashtu, Arabic (Gulf) and Urdu. There's a Maritime Intercept Operations (MIO) mode, which was developed for use in boarding operations in the Arabian Gulf. There are over 400 phrases in Arabic, Farsi, Urdu, and Hindi. There's a Debriefing Aid mode that has some 5,000 intelligence debriefing phrases and words rendered in Persian-Farsi, Singhalese, Haitian-Creole, Russian, Serbo-Croatian, Cambodian, Spanish, French, Korean, and Arabic (Egyptian). There are several different medical modes. The one watt speaker on the Phraselator can be easily heard, and the unit can be plugged into a public address system as well.

The first Phraselator appeared in 1998, but the true "Phraselator" didn't appear until early 2002, when they were first used in Afghanistan. The Department of Defense has bought nearly ten thousand so far, and the troops agree that it sure beats sign language or thumbing through a phrase book. The locals like it because it's yet another neat American gadget, and one that won't kill them as well. The next generation of Phraselator will enable true two-way communication. This technology is already available, but needs a laptop computer, with a big hard drive and a fast CPU. This kind of hardware will be available in PDAs in the next few years, which will make the two way Phraselator possible. Currently, about 7,000 military Phraselators are in use, mainly in Iraq and Afghanistan.
