

News from the Halifax ATS

There was a lot of activity around the Halifax ATS in May & early June about which I can report but first this little reminder about who we are:

The Halifax Auxiliary Telecommunications Service, or Halifax ATS, is an operational vehicle through which HARC contributes to emergency telecommuni-cations when a man-made or natural disaster strikes our community. This service is a joint effort of the 3 amateur radio clubs in the Halifax region, and it functions under the direction of the Halifax Emergency Management Office (EMO).

On every month's 2nd Wednesday at 10AM, the EMO Radio Advisory Group, made up of representatives from local ham radio clubs meets at the HARC Club Room to deal with big picture issues around emergency telecommunications. It is chaired by Barry Manuel, VE1JRG, the HRM's EMO Director. The Halifax ATS serves as the EMO's auxiliary operational wing.

On 17 May I made a presentation to a well-attended monthly HARC meeting on the topic: *Emergency Communications and Public Service as Key Drivers in the Growth of Amateur Radio.* I explored the link between an interest in emergency communication and the growth of our hobby. It was also an opportunity to explain & promote membership in the Halifax ATS I can report that at this time we have 27 registered members in the Halifax ATS - a good start but we are keen to enroll many more!

An important Halifax ATS Planning Meeting was held on 31 May in which we reviewed the status of various issues & initiatives. We have made progress in establishing a good website. We are working on populating our website categories with

information that will serve our members needs and provide an understandable & inviting face to those wishing to know more about us and our mission. Michael LeBlanc, VE1LEB, is helping us with this task and has agreed to be our webmaster. Once the website is up & running we will be able to post more details about the work of the Radio Advisory Group and ATS.

The Joint Emergency Management (JEM) sites also have a Council made of representatives from each of the 6 existing and planned JEMs. I addressed them on Thursday, 8 June, in order to introduce to them amateur radio and to explore the link between the Halifax ATS and themselves. I have offered to visit each JEM site and talk more extensively about amateur radio, the role of the ATS and the links that need to be forged with JEM Sites. Since Field Day is coming up in two weeks and is our most important annual test of our telecommunications readiness, I have also invited them to visit our backup EOC and operate on the GOTA Station.

Training: Terry Bigelow, VE1TRB, has developed an excellent Net Controller Course that will be on offer in the next training cycle. Tom Caithness, VE1GTC, our Training Officer tells me that starting in September there will be both introductory & advance courses offered through the fall & winter.

It is important that we enroll HARC members in the Halifax ATS, particularly hams who will diligently engage in the necessary training, practise sessions and exercises in order to be truly prepared for an emergency. However, we welcome non-amateurs as well. Soon we will be able to direct you to our website in order to enroll, but in the meantime you can contact Dave Musgrave, VE1EDA, about your interest. Dave, who is our membership officer, will see that you get the necessary information & application forms. A Special QSO

One of the things I enjoy most about the HF bands is having good conversations with hams in other countries. If an important goal of amateur radio is to foster understanding between people, isn't that a great way to do it?

Canard, Nova Scotia, November 16, 2016. I had a fellow ham's radio to fix, so I cleared the work bench, placed the sick radio in the middle, then for entertainment pushed our Kenwood TS-590's ON button and set the frequency to 14,253 kHz, where an interesting- sounding OSO was in progress. The corrective surgery on the workbench proceeded, the 20m QSO ended, but I didn't bother to change the Kenwood's frequency. Some minutes later the TS-590 spoke: "CQ CQ CQ .. This is 3DA0TM, 3DA0TM". I couldn't resist going back to such a rare country, so I moved over to the radio bench and sat down for a long and interesting QSO with Andy Cory, sitting at his radio bench in a little valley outside Mbabane, Swaziland, near the southeast coast of Africa 7760 miles away. Andy described Swaziland's beauty, the friendly people, his off-road 4X4 adventures in the high veldt, and the big animals of Swazi and nearby Kruger National Park. I had to admit to Andy that I had never been to Africa. "Why don't you come over and visit for a couple of weeks?" said Andy. "Are you serious?" "Sure, come over and

stay with us!" My xyl Helen VA1YL agreed, emails flew back & forth, and the flights were booked. Of course Helen and I expressed an interest in operating from Swazi, and Andy was able to get us actual Swazi calls, 3DA0FA and 3DA0YL. Since there were only 4 HF-active hams in Swazi, we increased the Swazi DXer population by 50%!

On 17 April 2017 we left Nova Scotia for Johannesburg, South Africa. Arrival in "Jo-berg" was followed by a 5-hour bus trip to Mbabane, the capital of Swaziland. Andy was waiting at the station with his rugged Toyota "Fortuner" 4x4 and took us to his beautiful home in a small steep valley in the hills a few km from the center of Mbabane,

where we met his xyl Meri, a talented graphic arts designer. Both Meri and Andy took most of the next 2 weeks off from their work to host us around the highlights of Swaziland and world-famous Kruger Big Game Park just to the north of Swaziland. Andy, a skilled offroad driver & instructor, took us

stone roads and stream-beds into the hills where many Swazis live and raise their maize, beans, melons, chickens, goats & cattle. Cattle, as much as emilangeni (rands) are still the currency of the country: a nice bride will set you back 7 cows.

After visiting a small nearby game park (Mlilwane), the four of us went north into South Africa, to Kruger National Park, 20,000 km² of

protected, unspoiled bushveldt, rivers, hills and savannah. It's bigger than all of Swaziland! While in Kruger it is strictly forbidden to get out of your car except in rest and camping areas that are closed and guarded at night.



However, the amazing animals and scenery you can see from your 4X4 make it a photographer's paradise. Meri and Andy were very skilled at spotting critters like lions, cheetahs, hyenas, baboons, jackals, leopards, etc. camouflaged in the long tan grass and big bushes of the great vistas of bushveldt, and in little river valleys. Loads of crocs and hippos in the ponds and rivers too...we didn't go swimming. Attempting to get the best pictures possible of the stunning African creatures and scenery, we took 2500 photos!!

One of our goals was to work hams back in Canada, especially our friends in Nova Scotia. With the help of hams here in Nova Scotia we spread the word via email when we planned to be on. We used Andy's Yaesu FT-100 transceiver, FL-2100Z linear and MFJ tuner feeding a TH-6 triband beam and 40 + 80m dipoles on a 14m tower, to put out Swazi's maximum legal power of 400W. However, the propagation gods weren't helpful, and even 20m to Europe was a great struggle with QRN, QSB, weak signals, and power line noise. No propagation to North America on 20m! Unfortunately, in addition to very poor propagation, just beyond Andy's antennas there were two sets of high voltage power lines, the nearer set just 130' away. Then there were the nearby hills: Andy's house is at 2700', but on a bearing of 285°, optimal for

Nova Scotia, there is a 4600' hill! Hence Andy often works North America by long path on 20-10m, so copying him in Nova Scotia could be by the 17,000 mile long path, not the 7700 mile short path!

We switched to 40m for the Americas, and had more success, although 40 only "hotted up" around 3-4 AM Swazi local (9 PM local in NS). At this horrible hour we crawled out of bed and contacted numerous US, South American, and Asian stations, many of whom were very excited and thanked us for a "new one" on 40m. Apparently most contacts with 3DA0 have been on 20m and up. South Africa and Namibia were the loud locals on 40m!

When we called for "Canadians only" on 40m we heard a frustrating number of "can't quite copy" stations in the mud, and had only three clear contacts with Nova Scotians: Dick Grantham VE1AI, Rob Steenweg VE1CHW, and Al Penney VO1NO/VE1. We also worked Canadians Dave Goodwin VE9CB, Carl Begin VA2ZP, and Garry Hammond VE3XN. Garry takes the prize for the Best Canadian Signal into Swazi!

In the end, Helen and I only worked 422 stations from all



parts of the world, but we were well satisfied. This wasn't intended to be a DX-pedition: we went to meet Andy and Meri, and to learn about and enjoy their beautiful country. Thanks so much, guys, for showing us a great time!

So what has amateur radio done for us lately? This great trip wouldn't have happened if we weren't hams!

The May monthly meeting of the Halifax Amateur Radio Club was declared open at 20:09 hrs with Brian (VE1AZV) in the Chair.

Motion to approve the April monthly meeting minutes as published in the HARC Reflector was made by Don (VE1DTR); seconded by Peter (VE1PJW). Carried.

President's Report: Brian had nothing specific to report under this topic.

Treasures report: Jim (VE1JG) presented the Treasurer's report for the month of April 2017. There was an opening bank balance for 1 April 2017 was \$6,929.23. Total income for the month of April was \$526.50 with expenses of \$248.50. There were no outstanding cheques therefore our cash position at the end of the month of April was \$7,207.23. A copy of the full report is appended to the official hard copy of these minutes.

Motion to approve the April report of the Treasurer - Moved by Jim (VE1JG)

Seconded by Bill (VE1MR) Carried.

Executive Reports: There were no other reports from members of the Executive.

Committee/Project Reports:

- CW Course Report Dick (VE1AI) reported that the CW class had started with 31 students but is now down to 7 dedicated students that have all achieved 5 wpm to this point.
- Brit Fader Scholarship 2017 Howard reported that he is in receipt of one completed application but that the deadline for receipt of applications is not until July 7th 2017.
- **Search and Rescue/EMO** David (VE1AJP) indicated that there had not been any searches this past month.
- **Membership** Howard (VE1DHD) reported that there are now 4 Life, 111 Full, and 28 Associate members for a total of 143; 51 of our members also belong to RAC.
- Flea Market Update Brian reported for Marc (VE1BEL) who was unable to attend. Brian reported that Marc has much of the organization planned but has outlined the positions that require support and encouraged members to contact to volunteer their assistance. The Centre will open for sellers at 8 am and 10 am for buyers, and a Friday evening social and Saturday morning breakfast will take place at the Chebucto Inn in Halifax.
- Field Day Update Brian outlined the importance of Field Day to our Club and since we are operating in the 2F category this year from the backup EMO-EOC, to our relationship with the HRM-EMO as well. Jason LaPierre (VE6TMR) volunteered to take on the overall coordination of the event this year. Bill (VA1ALW) volunteered to again coordinate the sideband radio operation; Scott (VE1QD) will oversee the GOTA station; Dick (VE1AI) will cover off the CW station. Alex will look

after promotion and the final ARRL submission.

- Equipment Silent Auction – Ian reported that Peter (VE1PJW) won the first silent auction – a hand-held radio.

Old Business:

- St Andrews Move Report Brian reported that it is important for the Club to begin planning seriously for the impending move by identifying what is to be thrown out, and what is to be kept and stored. The Executive agreed to meet for the next few Tuesday evenings to determine how much storage space is going to be required during the rebuilding of the St. Andrew's Centre, but first there needs to be an inventory drawn up of all of the contents in the Club station that need to be stored and what radio gear will go to a temporary site that can be used for radio operation for the next few years. Brian also reported that the city has agreed to find us a temporary operating position - possibly in the administrative building on Cowie Hill: our final home will need to be determined later, but it now seems unlikely to be back at a new St. Andrew's.
- Maritime Amateur Radio Calendar Project Howard reported that because of lack of interest, particularly from other Maritime Clubs, the Executive decided not to go forward with the project.

New Business:

- Scout Jamboree – July 2017 – Tom (VE1GTC) reported on the upcoming Scout Jamboree that will take place this summer at Camp Nedooae; will run from July 8 to 14th (setup 7th and teardown 17th) and will have its own special callsign – VE17JAM. The Scouts have requested assistance from HARC to provide radios and antennae for this event; HARC will

- Nametag Production Update Byron Mullett (VE1NFD) has been able to locate a vendor for the production of nametags and the Club will sell them for \$5 with pins or \$6 with a magnet backing.
- Museum Ships on the Air Weekend Jim (VE1JG) reported that the Club will work this weekend 3rd & 4th June from the Wireless Room in the Maritime Museum of the Atlantic, but in sight of the Acadia. They will work using both modern and historic radio equipment. Jim encouraged Club members to take part.
- **Red Cross** Jason LaPierre (VE6TMR) reported that the Red Cross is in the process of putting up a new antenna (multiband dipole). He also announced that the Red Cross Net will be on hiatus over the summer.
- MS Bike Tour Sheldon (VE1SJP) informed that he will be coordinating the fundraising bike ride on the weekend of July 29/30. This year the ride will take two different routes and planning is underway to ensure good repeater coverage; he has already identified a number of our Club members who will assist with communication.

- Maritime Museum of the Atlantic Eric (VE1EH) appealed to the membership to volunteer to assist in the Museum Wireless Room. We know what to do the next time to ensure the ascent rate is high enough.

The farthest digipeater that the payload accessed was in Matane, Quebec when the balloon was at ~ 97,642 feet - pretty good for 300 mW!

What happens to a Silent Key's Amateur Radio Operator Certificate?

Unless someone notifies the Amateur Radio Service Centre at Industry Canada, now known as Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada (ISED), so that the deceased ham's call sign can be deleted from the database, absolutely nothing happens and the callsign remains active until the SK's 125th birthday. This then begs the question as to how many of the Radio Amateur callsigns in the ISED database belong to SKs.

While the families of some Radio Amateurs are aware of the importance of cancelling the callsign of a deceased family member, I suspect that the vast majority are not. I would therefore suggest that all Radio Amateurs should, as a matter of course, instruct their families in a formal way as to how to cancel their callsign on their death. The best way to do this is to include a directive in our wills to the effect that the executor needs to contact the Amateur Radio Service Centre in Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada to report the passing of a licensed Radio Amateur; a copy of the deceased's obituary is required as confirmation.

Commentary, Observations, Thanks & Suggestions by this year's Flea Market Chairman, Marc J. Hemphill, VE1BEL

Good Job, Marc! -ed

Despite a late start, a relatively successful and reasonably profitable Flea Market was held on June 3rd. We had 219 paid participants and 65 vendor and display tables.

This year, we identified the participant's table with their name & call to speed up placement and to

reduce confusion. [Apologies to Scott VE1QD and one other as they had booked but were omitted from the floor plan. We had to scramble to correct that error.]

We had some difficulty this year in getting sufficient tables but we just managed. The number of tables available from the centre was reduced as one of the rooms was in use on the morning of the event. Many thanks to Murray MacDonald, VE1BB, and Calvin Presbyterian church for lending us 20 tables.

One change this year is that we provided a write-in ballot for the door prizes (serially numbered to keep an accurate count). It also meant that the winner did not have to be on site to win.

Another advantage is that the participant could enter their e-mail to be notified about next year's Market or other events of interest to Hams.

The door prizes consisted of 3 \$50 Canadian Tire gift cards and 4 \$25 gift cards from RadioWorld. The

DARC donated the Canadian Tire gift cards to mitigate losses from last year's event.

The 50/50 draw collected \$146 dollars, of which the Flea Market retained \$73. The call sign of the purchaser was written on the back of ticket so that the winner did not have to be present for this draw either.

The barbecue offering was less than stellar as the barbecue could not generate enough heat to cook properly. That will have to be addressed next year. Also, if we serve large sausages we will have to find a way to pre-cook them and finish them on the barbecue.

Unfortunately, more product was purchased than was needed. The pop, water, supplies & unopened condiments can be used on Field Day but the meat was a loss. We didn't quite break even with respect to food given the additional cost of gas and ice. We will cut this back next year.

As there was no gas cylinder on-site, a new cylinder was purchased. This will be donated to HARC for future use by the convenor.

Unfortunately, the NSARA representative could not make it due to an illness in the family. The RAC representative also could not make it.

If we are forced to change venues or it is preferable to find a new site, we'll have to look carefully at all requirements such as parking, security, person-traffic flow, public address and food issues.

I think we should not admit vendors until they have paid their admittance fee. It is an unnecessary nuisance to track them down after the fact.

Should we consider including one sales table with the \$5 admittance fee and asking for \$5 for each additional table?

Thanks to Pat Kavanaugh for setting up an excellent sound system. Unfortunately, the acoustics of the room and the overall level of noise reduced its effectiveness. Perhaps we can work towards a better way to do this

As many buyers wait up to an hour after buying their tickets, it would be good if we could hustle them into a room where we could offer them coffee and reduce the crowding of the hallway. Although we had rented a room for this purpose, no one took advantage of it.

There was some success in creating an updated database of clubs for notifications. We should double check and correct the list early next winter. A list should also be made of all on-air promotional opportunities and free print publications. This was hit & miss this year. Many thanks to all the volunteers from both clubs

who helped in setup, operation and tear down. All the effort isn't readily apparent during the Market. Armed with the experience of 2017, we need to get an earlier start, nail down volunteers much earlier and define their tasks beforehand. Tower Work

Saturday June 3 in the afternoon after the Flea Market several people gathered to see if the antennas could be repaired in preparation for the ARRL Field Day. The beam had high SWR on all bands, the sloper had high SWR on 80M & 40M and the vertical was poor on several bands.

It was apparent from the ground that one side of the air-wound balun on the beam had come off and when the climbers got up to where the sloper was attached they found one side was broken off as well as corrosion on the ground to the tower. The sloper was lowered to the ground for repair while the climbers cleaned up the ground point on the tower. The sloper was raised and a new bolt and nut attached the sloper to the tower. The climbers went up and reattached the loose side of the air wound balun on the beam.

Alex took measurements of both tower antennas on all bends and found them much improved but still not as good as when originally installed. They were deemed very usable for Field Day. Since it was getting on in the day it was decided to look at the vertical on another day.
