HARC Participates in the Spring Hobby Show at the Shearwater Aviation Museum



On Saturday May 6, 2017 a group of amateurs assembled on Nuttby Mountain at the Aliant radio site, lately the home of the VE1XK VHF repeater and UHF links to Gore & New Glasgow as well as VE1TRO packet. I hope I can remember all the Amateurs on site. Lorne, VE1BXK & Brad, VE1ZX came in from Parsburo, Bill, VE1MR, (me) drove up from Beaver Bank to meet up with Bruce, VE1II, Dave, VE1HUL, Rick, VE1DLH, & Scott, VE1CHL from Truro area. (Sorry for any I missed.)

We proceeded to remove the VHF repeater, RLC3 controller, UHF links & duplexer, the VE1TRO packet stack and some of the RF cabling. We tidied up. loaded the gear into various vehicles and went over to the Nuttby Provincial grid site, home of VE1TRO, 147.210 + (a few hundred metres away). While unloading some of the gear to go into the VE1TRO site Lorne and I checked possible problems with Packet & APRS at the site. The packet problem was readily apparent as the radio was not powered - the fuse had blown. Lorne replaced the fuse and Lorne & I tested the reflected power from the multi coupler cans. I did a slight adjustment to reduce reflected power to near zero. Then Lorne & I tested the reflected power on the APRS and found as much reflected power as forward power. We tested the cable for shorts but all appeared OK. I slightly adjusted the multi coupler cans with no effect. We removed the connector at both ends of the cable, saw no problems and rechecked with the same results. I replaced the problem cable with a spare cable of similar length cable, re-tested and this time the results were good. A slight adjustment of the multi coupler cans reduced the reflected power to near zero. The difference in cable lengths was less than 6 inches but the original cable must have been an impedance transformer at the

frequency being used.

Meanwhile, Brad and the others were preparing to install the RLC3 controller (4 ports) in place of the original RC210 controller (3 ports), the UHF links to Gore and New Glasgow and a new UHF link to Shubenacadie. During this, Hal, VE1LV, arrived from the Truro area to help as well. They moved the VHF repeater higher in the rack so some link radios could be installed below



it. They started to install 2 UHF duplexers in the rack but were running out of space. With a break for lunch we discussed how to best utilize space in one rack while adding to another rack to be able to make working on the gear easier. While this was happening it was noticed that some of the gear brought



into the building was supposed to go to Hilden or home with Bruce. Also, one link radio was missing. After everyone searched their cars it was later found - when someone got more gear from their car - under some other gear.

After lunch Brad and several others started to rearrange things. Brad ended up moving the same shelf 3 times until we were satisfied with the layout. They tidied up most of the wiring and ran cables from radios to duplexers & antenna feed lines. After most of this was done several people left for Hilden to



install the VE1XK VHF repeater and a shelf for packet & APRS in a rack there - leaving Lorne, Hal and I at Nuttby to adjust audio levels on the RLC3 controller.

Lorne loaded the RLC3 programming into the RLC3 controller to change the identifiers. Then Lorne and I adjusted the audio levels in the controller for the VHF repeater and various links. We tested the links and refined some of the adjustments but more work is needed on this as is completely new programming to take advantage of the additional full duplex link to Shubenacadie which was not fully tested. Hal was taking pictures all day and has since posted them on the Truro ARC Facebook page. Some of

President's Report: In the absence of Brian, there was no President's Report.

Treasures report: Jim (VE1JG) presented the Treasurer's report for the month of March 2017.

There was an opening bank balance

for 1 March 2017 of \$6,446.88. We had an income of \$784.60 and expenses of \$302.25. The bank balance as of 31 March 2017 was \$6,929.23 and there were no outstanding cheques, therefore our cash position at the end of the month of March was \$6,929.23. A copy of the full report is appended to the official hard copy of these minutes.

Motion to approve the April report of the Treasurer - Moved by Jim (VE1JG) Seconded by Bill (VE1MR): Carried

Executive Reports: There were no other reports from members of the Executive.

Committee/Project Reports:

- CW Course Report Dick (VE1AI) reported that the CW course is progressing well and that for the first time, the course is being taught as a distance education course so participants do the course from home. He reported that of the 31 who registered, there is a core of 10 who are regular participants and that the course is going well; in fact, some have already reached 5 wpm.
- Brit Fader Scholarship 2017 Howard reported that to this point, no applicants have been received. He indicated that he will send out a reminder to all Maritime Clubs again this week.
- **Search and Rescue/EMO** David (VE1AJP) was not present so there was no report.
- **Membership:** Howard (VE1DHD) reported that as of this evening there are 140 paid-up HARC members for 2017 Life 4; Full 108; Associate 28.
- Flea Market Update Marc (VE1BEL) reported that he has just taken over as the Chair of the Flea Market Committee and is going to start getting helpers organized. He will provide updates to the Club

He will provide updates to the Club and forward material to be posted on the HARC website.

- Field Day Update Don reported that there is not yet an overall coordinator for field day. While Dick (VE1AI) has agreed to manage the CW operation, and Alex (VE1RUS) has agreed to do the submission, we are still missing phone and GOTA coordinators and someone to manage food operations; someone to coordinate publicity and someone to manage bonus points. Dick indicated that the sloper (40/80/160) and beam both need attention. Ian (VE1IGP) pointed out that the Executive are concerned that at this late date a coordinator and individuals to cover many other key positions have not been identified, and suggest that there is a possibility that we may have to cancel Field Day for this year. Dick commented that most of the work is done by the radio (ssb cw) coordinators; it was nevertheless pointed out that the Field Day overall Coordinator is a critical position that must be filled if we are to go forward. Scott (VE1QD) commented that it is important that we do go forward because of our relationship with EMO and the fact that this year we are to operate from the back-up EMO site.
- Shearwater Hobby Show Report Craig reported that he and Doug (VE1LDL) as well as Ian (VE1IGP) and Tom (VE1GTC) set up at the Hobby Show in Shearwater last weekend and demonstrated several aspects of Amateur Radio. One of the vendors at the show made a presentation to the Club consisting of a framed advertisement for WWII "walkie talkies". They had a good cross-section stop by and show interest in Amateur Radio.
- Springhill Hamfest Scott reported on the upcoming SMART (Symposium for Martitime Amateur Radio Techs) that will be held on Saturday April 29th and put on by the WestCum Club. Scott encouraged members to attend and referred to the Maritime Amateur site for information.

- Nova Scotia Lighthouse Project -Scott reported that he and Dick have been talking with the NS Lighthouse Preservation Society about a possible collaboration with HARC. Dick and Scott have agreed to activate the Sambro Lighthouse during the International Lighthouse On the Air weekend in August this year. The Sambro Lighthouse is the oldest lighthouse in the Americas and so the issue of preservation of this facility is of great importance. Scott will forward information on this activation to the editor of the Reflector.
- Maritime Museum of the Atlantic – Dick (VE1AI) reported that during the recent March Break the Club manned the Wireless Room for ten days and had huge crowds visiting the Museum. Halifax is expecting a record number of cruise ships to be visiting Halifax this summer and this will translate into increased numbers of Museum visitors. Last year the Club gave out over 3500 certificates and expect that the number this summer to be much higher. As a result of the expected increase in activity, Dick is looking for additional HARC members to volunteer to help out.

Old Business:

- St Andrews Move Report – Don reported that is now clear that we will need to move from the St. Andrew's Centre at some point in 2018 as the building will be torn own. Barry Manuel has been talking with the Director of Parks and Recreation who have been tasked to find us temporary space during construction of the new Centre.

They will start by looking at suitable space at the Cowie Hill site. If the temporary space does not work for the Club in the long-term, then they will find space for us in the new building.

- Food Truck Rally Proposal Report Howard reported that the Executive have discussed the proposal but felt that there needed to be considerable planning to make such an event successful; a coordinator would also be required. If someone were to come forward to do the organizing, the Club would support the effort. However, for the present, this initiative will be placed on hold.
- Cowie Hill Container Bill (VE1MR) indicated that painting of the roof of the container has been differed (it is stainless steel) but that things need to be organized within in the container; we are still looking for someone to take on the coordination of work at the container site but as yet, no one has agreed to take this on.

New Business:

- HARC Name Tag Proposal (Jim reported for Byron Mullett) he indicated that the previous individual who made plastic name tags for Club members has moved some distance from Halifax so we have been looking for an alternate supplier. Byron has made contact with the Dartmouth Adult Services Centre who could make metal name tags for Club members with pin or magnet on the back. News from the Halifax ATS

One of the HARC's most important functions is to provide emergency and public service communications under a variety of circumstances in our Halifax region. Starting with this issue of the *Reflector*, I will be regularly updating you about news and activities pertaining to this vital HARC purpose.

The Halifax Auxiliary Telecommunications Service, or Halifax ATS, is an operational vehicle through which HARC contributes to emergency telecommunications when a manmade or natural disaster strikes our community. This service is a joint effort of the three amateur radio clubs in the Halifax region, and it functions under the direction of the Halifax Emergency Management Office. We are governed by Memoranda of Understanding between our respective Clubs and Halifax EMO as well as an articulation of operational relationships that are written into the

Halifax Master Emergency Plan.

It is our responsibility to recruit, train and organize skilled telecommunications specialists. The training prepares our members to operate in a unique emergency management environment, using unique procedures that are understood by the wide range of agencies and services that will be involved in any real emergency.

The amateur radio community constitutes the core of HATS' operation, but may at times also include non-amateur telecommunications operatives who act as coordinating links between various parts of the emergency management environment, such as neighborhood Joint Emergency Management (JEM) Sites.

Our HARC monthly meeting on 17 May will deal with the topic: *Emergency Communications and Public Service as Key Drivers in the Growth of Amateur Radio.* While the topic will shed further light on the role of the Halifax ATS and how

you can become involved, it will also place our role in a larger context related to the growth of amateur radio. I will be the presenter.

Many Club activities relate to providing communications for various events as a Public Service e.g. the MS Walk-a-thon, MS Bike-a-thon, a Car Rally, support for the scouting movement, etc. These events offer valuable practical experience for members as they develop the communication's skills that will be needed in an emergency – and it is very good public relations for amateur radio!

I look forward to seeing everyone at our meeting this month and to having many more of you join HARC's support for our Halifax community. 73 de Scott

these photos are shown here. Hal left for home while Lorne and I headed for the Hilden site.

I am not sure of all the people who went to the Hilden site but when we arrived there was Bruce, VE1II, Scott, VE1CHL & Brad, VE1ZX. The equipment was mostly installed and Lorne set the APRS on the installed shelf. Cables needed to be made up to go from the VHF repeater to the multi coupler cans. We routed the cables to find the required length and I put connectors on the repeater ends and another cable for the packet. The power supply for the packet & APRS was blowing fuses. Since I always carry a spare power supply on repeater trips we were able to replace the defective power supply. There is still some packet to install at a later date but the APRS

was set up and is operational. The identifiers needed to be changed in the controller and I was able to find an old enough programming software to make the changes. It was getting late and we all were getting tired from the long day so we did not adjust audio levels in the controller as it sounded fairly good. There is still more work to be done at the Hilden site (now VE1XK, 146.790-) new controller programming, setting up audio levels and installing the rest of the packet gear. The plan is to eventually replace the current repeater with a Yaesu Fusion repeater that will be able to do both digital and analog voice.

On the way home I mostly stayed on the VE1XK repeater to see what coverage it would have. I was able to work it up the airport and hill top after that and was able to work it while parked in my driveway. Everyone was pleased with the coverage which exceeded expectations.

Ham Radio Operators Still Have Role to Play By Anne Farries Published April 28, 2017

There are about 35 people in the Westcumb Amateur Radio Club, one of 29 clubs in the Maritimes.

The people who keep communication lines open when disaster strikes are looking for new talent.

That's amateur radio clubs, and they're increasingly filled by people above the age of 50, who would like to prepare the following generation to help in a crisis, says Mike Johnson, emergency management coordinator for Cumberland County.

"We have so much technology that we rely on, and when it's taken away, it creates a problem," Johnson said Thursday. "There's no question we need new blood."

Once licensed, amateur radio operators — or HAM operators — can "set up a radio with a 12-volt battery and transmit to the world, to let them know how things are," Johnson said.

In a crisis, if the servers that look after cellphone and landline transmission are down, "getting hold of emergency responders gets to be difficult, because people who live in, say, a 661 prefix can't call a 667 prefix, so they can't get through to the emergency service," Johnson

said. So in Cumberland County, for example, "Ham radio members go to the various fire departments where we've already arranged equipment,".

"We broadcast to the public: If you have an emergency, please call the local fire department. From the local fire department that information is passed on to the amateur radio member, who relays it through to a central location where the appropriate organization — ambulance, fire, police — is able to respond to the incident."



That system was formalized in 2008, after a backhoe on the side of the Trans-Canada Highway in Amherst cut the fibre-optic cable, Johnson said.

"All digital communication east of that point to Newfoundland went down. ATMs, all 1-800 numbers, 911 — even TMR (trunk mobile radio, used by police and fire services) linking is done by Internet, so the communication between TMR towers went down.

"It was a major communication loss."

During that incident, fire departments radioed emergency calls to a central location, where the appropriate agency was notified.

That led to amateur radio clubs agreeing to provide service to several fire stations in Cumberland County and now, "they're deeply entrenched with us," Johnson said. "They have offices in here ... with high-frequency radios for worldwide communication, as well as VHF for local communication.

"We purchase equipment, they maintain the process. So we get a lot of free work out of them and they get some equipment out of us. It works out very well."

There are about 35 people in the Westcumb Amateur Radio Club, one of 29 clubs in the Maritimes. Members share technical tips and run field days, including fox hunts, where a low-power transmitter is

hidden and the person who finds it first wins a free radio.

They also help in fundraisers, such as athletic races through areas where cellphone service is not available.

"We have a very active organization here, a forward-looking group of people, and we have a great relationship with the municipality," Johnson said.

Elsie MacGill's life was one of firsts: the first woman in Canada to earn a degree in electrical engineering; first woman in the world to be awarded a master's degree in aeronautical engineering; first woman to design a plane; first woman to hold the position of chief of aeronautical engineering at an aircraft company; and the brains behind the world's first mass-produced aircraft. Soon after World War Two erupted in Europe, Elsie's Canadian Car & Foundry in what is now Thunder Bay, Ont., was selected to manufacture the Hawker Hurricane for the Royal Air Force in 1939. Elsie took control of production, streamlined operations to churn out increasing numbers of

aircraft, and even designed a series of modifications to equip the fighter for cold-weather flying. By 1943, the company had produced more than 1,400 Hurricanes and its workforce had grown from 500 to some 4,500 – more than half of them women. Elsie had devised and perfected the mass production of aircraft, a mode of production that was soon the norm worldwide. No wonder this Canadian woman of firsts was crowned "Queen of the Hurricanes."
