SIXTH MARITIME DX FORUM Halifax, Nova Scotia 7 - 8 August 2009

The Halifax Amateur Radio Club (HARC) invites DXers, contesters and HF enthusiasts to the 2009 Maritime DX Forum. On **Friday**, 7 August, a **reception** and **registration** will begin at 7:00 pm. The **MDF program** on **Saturday**, **8 August** will run from 8:30 am - 4:45 pm, followed by a reception and the DX **banquet** at 6:00 pm.

<u>Location</u>. The MDF will be held in the Rosaria Centre of Mount St. Vincent University on Seton Road, the entrance to MSVU off the Bedford Highway. Their general telephone number is (902) 457-6287. Please Google *Mount St. Vincent University Location* to see a map. Inexpensive accommodations are available at the University (details below).

Background. Maritime DX Forum had its beginning in August 2004 with a gathering of twenty DX enthusiasts in the home of Scott Wood, VE1QD, on Moser's Island, near historic Peggy's Cove. It was an intimate gathering in Scott's living room with featured speaker Kim Mathiason, OZ1MAL. Kim arrived by sailboat, dropped anchor in front of Scott's home and captivated us with tales of operating DX from his 42-foot sloop. Also, Dick Grantham, VE1AI, recounted the 1993 Gambia (C51A) Dxpedition; John Scott, VE1JS, conducted the organizational meeting for the new Maritime Contest Club, and Scott Wood, VE1QD, led the discussion that formally organized the Maritime DX Forum. From this humble beginning in 2004 the DX Forum has grown steadily, increasing in attendance and attracting outstanding local, national and international participants.

Program. This year our program reaches new heights with four world-class speakers. DX Forum lineup includes:

- Our keynote speaker, Martti Laine, OH2BH, will talk about his recent experiences in helping develop amateur radio in various parts of the world under the title: Turning New Stones: Building Passion for Amateur Radio.
- Taking us in a more technical direction, Joe Taylor, K1JT, a Nobel Laureate in Astrophysics, and life long contributor to amateur radio, will talk about Advances in Weak Signal Communication: WSJT and More

- **Doug Zwiebel, KR2Q**, renowned for his low power contesting feats, will talk about *QRP Contesting from Home Stations*. This part of the program is being organized in partnership with the Maritime Contest Club, a new global competitor that is making its mark in contest circles.
- George Nicholson, N4GRN, will share with us the excitement and visual images of 2009's first significant DXpedition: *The 2009 Desecheo Island DXpedition* that took place in February 2009. George is also a member of HARC.

There will be ample time to talk with each of our program presenters: first, at the reception on Friday night and then during the coffee breaks, lunch and DX banquet reception on Saturday. Cushcraft has been an MDF sponsor since 2005 and will again provide a nice antenna as a door prize. John David, KB1T, their manager of amateur sales, will be attending the MDF. John Scott, VE1JS, a volunteer ARRL QSL card checker will be on hand to confirm credits for DXCC, WAS & VUCC awards.

Cost and Registration. The cost of the MDF program, including the Friday reception and Saturday lunch, is \$45. The cost of Saturday evening's DX banquet is \$35. There will be a cash bar at the receptions on Friday and Saturday. A copy of the MDF Registration Form is attached. Maritime DX Forum Foundation. To help augment the costs of operating and developing the MDF, we annually solicit donations. This money goes to provide travel support for speakers when needed and to cover developmental costs. Details about the Foundation are attached.

Silent Keys: No silent keys reported. The father of club member Sherry, VE1WST, father-in-law to David, VE1AJP and grandfather to Ian, died in March, after a long illness. Our condolences go out to Sherry, David and family.

There being no guests present, the members introduced themselves.

Regrets: Murray, VE1MMD advised that Howard, VE1DHD sent his regrets.

Minutes:

Motion THAT the minutes of February 18th be accepted as published in the Reflector, noting they were scribed by Don, VE1DTR, Acting Secretary.

Moved by Doug, VE1LDL. Seconded by Tom, VE1GTC. Motion carried.

Old Business

RAC AGM 2010 As per notice in the Reflector, Dave Goodwin stepped down as RAC's President. Scott, VE1QD spoke with Dave, who confirmed that the HARC invitation to host the meeting had been on the January Agenda and approved unanimously, at that time. Scott will follow up with the new president, who has yet to confirm that reported status for the AGM. Murray, VE1MMD received an email in response to his request for a link to the new RAC president denying that request for the present time. Murray reported the email further indicated the incoming president had no information about the AGM to be hosted by HARC. At present, we cannot move forward on this issue. Howard, VE1DHD advised Murray he'd sent an email to submit information for the TCA and received a response that emails are read once a week by volunteers. If too many are received, they are read the following week.

Canada Winter Games 2011: Murray, VE1MMD reported three responses from various 2011 Committee members and a meeting will be set up a week from Friday.

<u>Tall Ships 2009</u>: There has been no response to an email offering our club's assistance.

HARC Trailer Project: Murray, VE1MMD reported the Honda generator has been ordered. The best price, and supplier, is based in Commeauville.

<u>Club Access</u>: Access codes are available for members and will be issued by Station Manager.

Radio purchase: Murray reported that the 746 Pro to be purchased for the station was budgeted at \$1800 plus. Thanks to negotiation with the Sales Manager we have a new radio on site that, with GST and shipping cost us \$990.00.

RCI Visit April 4th Rob, VE1KS organized a tour for HARC members on Saturday, April 4th at 1100 hours. Members are to meet there. If anyone wants to carpool they were invited to take a copy of the sign up list of members planning to go to arrange drives. RCI can accommodate as many as 20. Ten is enough, but numbers must known by the end of the meeting.

Brit Fader Scholarship: Howard, VE1DHD submitted his report via email (see attached). Application forms have been updated and are posted on the club's website – take the link on the home page to the scholarship information and choose the application form link at the bottom of the page. An advertisement will be run in the May/June issue of TCA. RAC will issue a bulletin online in both official languages. The value of the 2009 Scholarship will

be \$1000. Club members who know of eligible candidates should encourage them to apply. Criteria (see details on line) include the applicants being a citizen of Canada, hold an active Basic Class or higher Canadian amateur radio license and be aware that the scholarship is for attendance at an accredited Canadian post-secondary technical school, college or university. Preference will be given to applicants who have been accepted into a program in the field of electronics or electrical engineering. Submissions must be postmarked no later than July 15th 2009.

Mobile D-STAR - Bill, VE1MR stated there is a Mobile D-STAR radio available for a member to use/ test. Rob, VE1KS has one, and Don, VE1DTR has another. Three radios have been provided for members to borrow and use to test the D-Star repeater capability. Bill noted that the repeater is difficult to hit from outside Halifax. He asked that Murray, VE1MMD and/or Don, VE1DTR be advised as to who has these radios. The repeater will be at the club site until the end of April. From the ARRL Letter, Vol. 28, No. 10 US Coast Guard to Discontinue LORAN Stations

The US Coast Guard http://www. uscg.mil/> has announced that due to economic conditions, they would be closing down the 24 LORAN-C (Long Range Aid to Navigation) http://www.navcen.uscg.gov/loran/ default.htm> stations operated under the auspices of the USCG. LORAN stations provide navigation, location & timing services for civil and military air, land & marine users. According to the USCG, LORAN-C is approved as an en route supplemental air navigation system for both Instrument Flight Rule (IFR) and Visual Flight Rule (VFR) operations. The LORAN-C system serves the 48 continental states, their coastal areas and parts of Alaska.

LORAN-A stations were developed beginning in World War II. Signals were transmitted on frequencies in and around our present-day 160 meter band. LORAN-A was responsible for reduced amateur radio operations, including frequency & power limitations, on 160 meters in the US. In 1979, the Coast Guard phased out the LORAN-A stations; they were replaced by LORAN-C stations. LORAN-C stations operate on 100 kHz, enabling the restrictions on the 160m amateur band due to LORAN functions, to be dropped.

According to the Coast Guard, they will continue to operate the current LORAN-C system through the end of fiscal year 2009.

Earlier this year, US Fish & Wildlife Service (USFWS) announced that they would open Midway Atoll http://www.fws.gov/midway/ to Amateur Radio operations for two weeks, from October 5-19, 2009

Tom Harrell, N4XP, of Monroe, Georgia, & Dave Johnson, WB4JTT, of Aitkin, Minn., have put together a team of 19 operators from all over the world to activate Midway Atoll for a 10 day period as K4M http://www.midway2009.com/. This the first time that USFWS has allowed amateurs to operate from the wildlife refuge since 2002.

"Midway ranks as Number 24 worldwide and Number 13 in Europe on DX Magazine's Most Wanted List http://www.dxpub.com/," Harrell & Johnson said. "Activity will be on 6-160 meters with 5 to 6 stations. At least one station will be active on 20m. around the clock for those who need it for a new country. Efforts will be made to meet the demand to the most needed geographical areas, the low bands & RTTY." The team has posted a list of planned frequencies on their Web site

http://www.midway2009.com/kh4freqs.html>.

The co-leaders said that travel to the atoll is only allowed by chartered aircraft: "Because of the size of the aircraft, it will only be able to carry the team, requiring the equipment to be shipped by boat some months ahead."

In January, the USFWS started a program to encourage visitors to experience Midway's wildlife, history & culture, as well as non-wildlife-dependent activities. To ensure the safety of the wildlife on the Refuge Amateur Radio operations will be permitted for 2 weeks and only within a designated area on the north side of Sand Island. Midway Atoll Refuge Mngr Matt D. Brown said that portable generators will not be permitted but there is 120V power available at the operation site.

Midway is located in the North Pacific Ocean, approximately 1250 miles northwest of Honolulu. Less than 150 miles east of the International Dateline, Midway Atoll is truly "midway" around the world from the Greenwich meridian. Midway Atoll National Wildlife Refuge which has international significance for its historic & natural resources is owned & administered by the USFWS.

Co-written and updated by Wes Hayward, W7ZOI, Rick Campbell, KK7B, and Bob Larkin, W7PUA, "Experimental Methods in RF Design" explores wide dynamic range, low distortion radio equipment, the use of direct conversion and phasing methods and digital signal processing. Use the models and discussion included in the book to design, build and measure equipment at both the circuit and the system level.

Readers are immersed in the communications experience by building equipment that contributes to understanding basic concepts and circuits. The updated version of "Experimental Methods in RF Design" is loaded with new, unpublished projects. Presented to illustrate the design process, the equipment is often simple, lacking the frills found in current commercial gear. The authors understand that measurement is a vital part of experimentation. Readers are encouraged to perform measurements on the gear as they build it. Techniques to determine performance and the measurement equipment needed for the evaluations are discussed in detail and include circuits that the reader can build.

IARU Region 1 has invited the HQ stations of IARU Member-Societies, as well as the EOCs of Emergency Communications Groups (ECGs), to participate in the 2009 Global Simulated Emergency Test (GlobalSET), on Saturday, April 18, 2009 from 1100-1500 UTC http://www.arrl.org/news/files/2009GlobalSET.pdf.

The GlobalSET will take place on and near the emergency Center of Activity (CoA) frequencies on 80, 40, 20, 17 and 15 meters, \pm QRM.

The intent of the 2009 GlobalSET is for established IARU Headquarters stations and EOCs to test their capabilities. Usually held in May, the 2009 GlobalSET was moved to April to tie into World Amateur Radio Day. The theme of W. A.R.D. 2009 is "Amateur Radio: Your Resource in Disaster & Emergency Communication."

<u>Tools Explained:</u> UTILITY KNIFE: Used to open and slice through the contents of cardboard cartons delivered to your front door; works particularly well on contents such as seats, vinyl records, liquids in plastic bottles, collector magazines, refund checks, and rubber or plastic parts. Especially useful for slicing work clothes, but only while in use.
