Call to Order: There being a quorum present (27 paid-up full members), President Murray MacDonald (VE1MMD) called the 2010 Annual General Meeting of the HARC to order at 2016 hours on November 17th, 2010.

Approval of the Agenda:

Motion: THAT the Agenda be accepted.

Moved by Dick (VE1AI). Seconded by Scott (VE1QD).

No additions were requested from the floor. Motion carried.

Appointment of a Secretary for the AGM:

Motion, that Howard (VE1DHD) be appointed the secretary for the 2010 AGM.

Moved by Tom (VE1GTC); seconded by Betty (VE1BSW) Motion carried.

Minutes of the 2009 Annual General Meeting:.

Motion: THAT the minutes of the 2009 Annual General Meeting be accepted as read. Moved by Howard (VE1DHD); seconded by Tom (VE1GTC).

Motion carried.

Annual Report of the President: President Murray MacDonald (VE1MMD) thanked members of the outgoing Executive for their hard work and gave an overview of the many events and activities undertaken by the club during the past year, as well as Club accomplishments. He also made some recommendations for the future. See details in the attached copy.

Membership Report - Howard (VE1DHD) reported for Sheldon (VE1GPY), indicating that there are 4 Life members; 38 Associate (increased over September due to the new Basic Class – their membership carries over into 2011) and 113 Full members for a total of 155 paid-up members for 2010.

Brit Fader QSL Bureau Report -

Tom (VE1GTC) indicated that the work of the Bureau proceeds in a timely fashion. Tom is looking into a way of communicate with Hams who have unclaimed cards in the bureau. He will try communicating through local clubs or directly to individuals ifs contact information is available.

Treasurer's Report of the 2010 Audited Financial Statements: Keith (VE1STN) presented the 2009-2010 Fiscal Audit. See attached copy for details.

Motion: THAT the Auditor's Report and Financial Statement be accepted as presented.

Moved by Keith (VE1STN). Seconded by Dave (VE1NN). Motion carried.

Consideration of Budget for current fiscal year: Bill (VE1MR) presented the proposed budget for 2011. For details see the copy to be provided by Bill.

Motion: THAT the budget for the new fiscal year 2011 be accepted as presented.

Moved by Bill (VE1MR). Seconded by Bruce (VE1MLW)

Motion carried.

Budget Discussion: In view of the fact that a previous motion required the inclusion of a storage container in the 2011 budget, an entry that could cost the club in excess of \$7,000, there was a discussion around the necessity of procuring a storage container and exactly what the additional costs would be for placing it on a foundation and making it suitable as a safe and dry storage area for club equipment. Wayne indicated that there is a great deal of equipment in storage at the Bloomfield Centre and we need to asses what is useful to the club and what should be either taken to flea markets or taken to the junk. While concern was raised with respect to including a storage container in the budget, it was

pointed out that any capital expense over \$500 will have to come back to a meeting for final approval and all were aware that flexibility is required and that the club should strive to stay within its budget.

Consideration of a motion of ratification of the previous year's activities of the Officers: Murray, VEIMMD asked the membership if they would ratify the past year's activities of the Officers as conducted on behalf of the club.

Motion: THAT the business activities of the Officers conducted on behalf of the HARC and its members during the fiscal year 2009/2010 be deemed acceptable and officially sanctioned. Moved by Doug (VE1LDL). Seconded by Fraser (VE1WO). Motion carried.

Election of officers for 2011: President Murray MacDonald, VE1MMD passed the meeting over to Tom, VE1GTC, to preside over the election. It was confirmed that the required 23-member quorum had been achieved (27 full members in attendance).

Basic Amateur Radio Course 2011

Amateur Radio is alive and well if one can judge from the turnout in this year's course: (six men and five ladies). This is the largest number of potential new "YL" operators in any recent course. The higher registration this year is comprised of eleven students sitting for the instructed course and three taking self-study. Two of the self-study individuals could not commit to sitting in the class and plan to self-study at their own pace and prepare over a longer period of time.

Three of the students in our class indicated their interest at last spring's Shearwater Hobby Show. Some students found out about the course from the HARC website, others heard about it via PSAs on CBC radio, plus other advertisements. Three others are returning to the course after taking a previous course in the past. There are a few students who were encouraged to take the course from licenced amateurs in our club.

The course this year is well underway with over 60% of the course material covered and only four topics left to be completed from Thursday November 10. The last topic on RFI is to be covered in early December barring any snow storms. The students are encouraged to use the excellent ExHaminer program, written by VE2AAY and donated as downloadable freeware to RAC. It has helped all of the classes prepare for their exam. The Industry Canada exam for the students is scheduled for 10:00 a.m. Saturday December 10 in the club classroom.

One of the more rewarding tasks in amateur radio is assisting new individuals, young or old to obtain their amateur radio licence and callsign. In this light anyone who has encouraged students to take the course, mentored or assisted new hams, shared their passion for the hobby and other outreach activities deserve a thank you.

Thank you to the instructors and the HARC examiners for this years' 2011 Basic Course.

The HF vertical and a VHF vertical were mounted at the top of the EMO tower. The dipole was strung between the top of the EMO tower and a nearby unused flag pole. This gave us an east-west pattern. We planned to listen for the ISS, if time and flight path permitted, but unfortunately there was no time to do so.

During the morning we were plagued with cable and connectors problems but we still managed to put the Cubs and Scouts on the air. We used our lunch break to repair and replace faulty gear.

John Goodwin (VE1CDD) reported that the opening balance was \$16,844.74, expenses for the month were \$392.97, income was \$1,447.27, outstanding cheques \$284.95, which results in a closing bank account balance of \$18,115.79. Executive Reports:

Reports of the President, First Vice President and Secretary were posted in the October Reflector. Station Manager, Wayne Harasimovitch (VE1WPH) was absent – No report. Second Vice President, Rod Padmore (VE1BSK) was absent. However, Fraser MacDougall (VE1WO) reported that tonight's speaker will be Scott Wood (VE1QD) and that tonight's door prize is a multi-purpose tool.

Committee Reports:

Membership – Carol Wood (VE1HAZ) provided her report to the executive and it is attached to these minutes. For 2010/2011, the club has 100 fully paid up members as well as 28 associate members and 4 lifetime members.

Basic Course – Barry Diggins (VE1TRI) reported that there are 11 students attending the current classes and 3 students who self-study. Barry thanked all the instructors who have given their time. Barry asked that if anyone has a copy of the 7th edition of the RAC Basic Study Guide to donate or sell to please let him know.

Call Book – Howard Dickson (VE1DHD) was absent. Scott Wood (VE1QD) reported that he is working on advertising for the call

book. He has one cover advertisement booked but needs another. Radio World is no longer advertising. Scott commended Win Hartlin (VE1WIN) for his dedicated work in procuring advertisements from businesses in Sackville. Scott mentioned that he has been approaching businesses in given areas and asking them to advertise together on one page, each business taking a small ad. He finds this is a successful way of presenting this to advertisers. Fraser MacDougall (VE1WO) said that if every single club member were to obtain one advertiser for the call book, it would make the project very successful.

Strategic Planning Committee -Bob Swinwood (VE1PQ) reported on behalf of himself and Gary Bartlett (VE1RGB), the members of this committee. The full report of this committee can be found in the October, 2011 Reflector. Bob explained the process that he and Gary used to come up with the Mission Statement. Some members thought that the Mission Statement was too wordy or maybe should have been more than one sentence. Some liked the original Mission Statement defined by the HARC executive. It appears that we must now print off the application form and send it by mail with our cheque.

New Business:

Whyalla Amateur Radio Club – Fraser MacDougall (VE1WO) read an e-mail from Alex Glinski (VK5ALX) asking us to take part in a maritime commemorative event on January 8, 2012. Full transcript of Fraser's e-mail exchange with Alex is attached to the October 5, 2011 Executive Minutes. The Executive has decided that we will take part in

this event and will be working to figure out times and modes by which to do this. Discussion.

DX Forum Financial Report 2011 - Full report is attached to these minutes. Scott Wood (VE1QD) gave an overview of the report pointing out that, although this was a very high quality event, not enough people were willing to pay the \$145 for the full weekend and therefore only \$600.54 of the \$1,000.00 seed money was returned to the club. There was a shortfall of \$399.46 which the club will absorb. Scott is looking for ways to do this again more cheaply so we won't lose money perhaps carrying on the event every second year, by co-operation with other maritime provinces or by scaling back and doing a more locally-based event. Discussion. It was agreed that we need a special meeting to discuss all of this at length.

<u>50/50 Draw</u> - \$25.50 was won by Hans Anderson from Denmark (OZ1HE).

<u>Door prize</u> – a multi-purpose tool was won by George Nicholson (VE1GRM).

There being no further business, on a motion by Dick Grantham (VE1AI), the meeting was adjourned at 8:50 p.m..

THE SENILITY PRAYER

Grant me the senility to forget the people I never liked anyway, the good fortune to run into the ones I do, and the eyesight to tell the difference. From the ARRL Letter, May 12, 2011 **Amateur Radio in Space: Celebrating 50 Years of OSCAR I and Amateur Radio Satellites**by ARRL News Editor S. Khrystyne Keane, K1SFA

Launched into space on December 12, 1962, OSCAR I was the first Amateur Radio satellite -- and the first non-government bird -- to go in to space

Just four years earlier, the Soviet Union had launched Sputnik I, the first human-made object to orbit the Earth, ushering in the Space Age. For the next 30 years, the Cold War rivalry between the US and the former Soviet Union focused on attaining firsts in space exploration. The "space race" involved pioneering efforts to launch artificial satellites, sub-orbital and orbital human spaceflight around the Earth, as well as piloted voyages to the Moon.

1961. Mercury-Redstone 2 launches into space carrying Ham the Chimp. Soviet cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin becomes the first human in space. Alan Shepard becomes the first American in space aboard Mercury-Redstone 3. Gus Grissom, piloting the Mercury-Redstone 4 capsule Liberty Bell 7, becomes the second American to go into space. OSCAR I -- Orbiting Satellite Carrying Amateur Radio -- the very first Amateur Radio satellite, is launched into space.

Barely four months after the successful launch of Sputnik I, the U.S launched the unmanned Explorer I on January 31, 1958. At about that same time, a group of hams on the West Coast -- Lance Ginner, K6GSJ; Chuck Smallhouse, W6MGZ; Ed Beck, K6ZX; Al Diem; Chuck Townes, K6LFH (SK), and Nick Marshall, W6OLO (SK) -- began toying with the idea of launching an Amateur Radio satellite into orbit and organized themselves into Project OSCAR. After a series of high level exchanges among Project OSCAR members, the ARRL and the US Air Force, a launch opportunity on a Thor DM-21 Agena-B rocket from Vandenberg Air Force Base in California was secured for the very first Amateur Radio satellite: OSCAR I. It was successfully launched into a low Earth orbit on December 12, 1961 -- 4 years after the launch of Sputnik I. The satellite was also the world's first non-government bird.

Fifty years later ARRL Lab Test Engineer Bob Allison, WB1GCM. Was inspired to take the back-up OSCAR I on display at ARRL Headquarters and make it work again. So W1AW Station Manager Joe Carcia, NJ1Q and Allison began tinkering with the satellite, one of three made by Project OSCAR. One of the satellites went up into space in 1961, one is on display at the Smithsonian Air and Space Museum in Washington, DC and the other was until recently sitting in a display case on the first floor of the HQ building in Newington.

After much trial and error, Carcia finally got OSCAR I to transmit a signal on 145 MHz, just as the original satellite did. "Since specific technical literature on the satellite was unavailable, information taken from 1962 QST and CQ articles assisted in the reconstruction of the transmitter in the ARRL unit," Carcia explained. "Much care was given to salvage the original components, although time had taken its toll on most of the circuitry. As such, although the transmitter functions, the actual keying of the transmitter is performed using a PIC beacon keyer. Power is supplied using a standard wall-cube providing 12 V dc."

In honour of OSCAR I's 50th anniversary, the rebuilt satellite was on display at the ARRL EXPO area at the Dayton Hamvention, May 20-22 hooked up to a dummy load running very low power, and as you walked by, you could hear it transmit "HI HI," just as it did 50 years ago.


In March 1946 it was revealed to the public that Britain, the US & Canada had tried to build a gigantic aircraft carrier made of ice. It was to be longer than 5 football fields, wider than 2, weigh some 2,000,000 tons and would sit in the middle of the North Atlantic to guard vital shipping lanes. The project's code name was Habbakuk. Work on a 60 ft. long prototype was begun in Lake Patricia, Alberta. It quickly became apparent that ordinary ice was too brittle but ice made of a waterwood fiber slurry (named pykrete in honour of Geoffrey Pyke who had come up with the entire scheme and sold Mounbatten on it). Pykrete could be easily sawed or planed into desired shapes, resisted melting and didn't shatter when struck by a bullet.

But by 1943 the Allies had been getting the upper hand in the Battle of the Atlantic. Aircraft able to cover the shipping lanes in their entirety were coming into service. Habbakuk disappeared late that year.

Today, a plaque on Lake Patricia's shore commemorates the mini-Habbakuk that once floated there. On the lake bottom there's another plaque where the remains of its wooden & metal superstructure can still be found.

Eastern Shore DX Association (ESDXA)

You may be unaware that there is a small, but very active DX Club in Nova Scotia. This club consists of a number of local Hams who share a common interest: Chasing DX. That's it. There are no other requirements for membership. We do not have any membership standards such as preferred mode, power, any arbitrary DXCC total or other perceived measures of DXing prowess. An entry level Ham with 10 watts working phone only into a random length of wire is on equal footing with the season Old Timer who can rattle off 40 WPM CW with a KW into a huge antenna. All that is required is that a passion for DXing.

Readers may be surprised that there is no executive. That's right. No president, no secretary, etc. And, no dues. How can such a club exist? Who makes the decisions? Who organizes things? The answer is through a collaborative, non-competitive spirit. If we are asked if this is possible, we point to the club's longevity, consistent camaraderie, friendship and mutual respect. Most members in this group have been meeting informally for about 15-20 years, about once every week or two. Meetings are scheduled on an ad hoc basis, and it is rare for all members to be in attendance at any given meeting. Members who miss meetings are brought up to speed on anything important by telephone, email or on VHF radio.

There have been requests over the years to define membership "rules." If we are pushed for an answer, we simply say: "There is no competition between members." DXCC totals are never discussed. New DX achievements by members are warmly acknowledged without consulting one's own totals first. A genuine offer of congratulation is what we offer. Common topics of discussion at our meetings are recent DX heard or worked, QSLs received, mutual advice on how to better work a DXpedition or semi-rare country (what time of day, which bands and modes are the most likely to be successful, etc.) Often, stories of good (or not so good) DXpeditions and great operators of the past and present are shared.

We share operating hints, hardware configuration tips, QSL strategies, logging software ideas and anything else that will further the DXing goals of our members. Not all members have the same DXing goals, and that's fine. We believe DXing is a personal achievement. Some measure it by simply working a new one. Others want a QSL card to confirm it. Some want to work them on every band and mode possible, and then have their QSLs verified by some awards group. We never expect others to do it our way, or insist that any particular strategy or self-imposed regulation is better that those used by others. We embrace changes in technology and government regulations. We always welcome a better approach to getting a new one in the log. We never dismiss something simply because it isn't the way we did it in years past.

Upon reflection, one of the members summed up the ESDXA as a group of Ham friends who enjoy seeing everyone working as much DX as possible. As we move into solar cycle 24, we look forward to more DX and continued friendship. That's what the ESDXA is all about. To borrow the theme of the British FOC club, we conclude by quoting Samuel Johnson: "A man should keep his friendship in constant repair."
