It has been tested to death and shown to be optimum. There are two primary advantages: (a) the student is entirely in control of the rate at which he or she may progress in learning the code, and (b) the characters that are sent by the program are not unnaturally slow but are sent, individually, at a speed consistent with what the operator will hear in the real world. This is known as the Koch method of learning and was widely used by both the military and Coast Guard when both those agencies employed CW for communication.

The assembly took less than 2 hours proving that many hands make light work. We took a short tour of the new club rooms. Many thanks to the crew that assembled the tower section.



DESCRIPTION

The Umac 606 is an infernal anode, helical beamed phantasatron having a dissipation rating. The unique vacuum in the phantasatron is of the double-pumped type, permitting a clear view of the non-emitting triple-processed plunger-type plate. Because of its unique self-flushing construction, this tube will remain usable throughout its useful life.

The grid is constructed of a rare metal senileium chosen for its total lack of emission. Primary, secondary, and tertiary electrons are fully suppressed by a left-hand inclination toward the ecliptic extending from the nadir to the zenith. This also compensates for abberations in azimuthal displacements common in tubes of previous design, wherein the focal point was improperly focused due to chromatic sphericalizm.

The urinated tungsten filament is unique. This process is secret.² The uranium used for the urination is of the triple distilled, single isotope variety with all neutrons removed. This material is obtained direct from the AEC-Los Alamos.

Greater Toronto Area Repeater Jamming Activity - activity that currently plagues our repeaters in the Greater Toronto Area.

Several of the repeaters in the Greater Toronto Area, including VA3XPR. VE3YYZ FM & VE3YYZ DMR, have become almost unusable due to jamming, profane language, playback of recordings and even radio ID spoofing with DMR. For VA3XPR, the nefarious activity can be found not just on the local talkgroups, but also the global ones, resulting in the disruption of communications, not just here in the greater Toronto area, but around the world as well thereby tarnishing the image of Toronto area hams on a global scale.

What motivates the culprits to engage in such activities? It's my understanding that it stems from an on-going feud among several local hams. While I am not interested in the history behind their disagreement, I am very concerned & dismayed by the impact that is has on the ham radio community. Ham radio is a global community and we're supposed to be courteous and helpful to one another in a manner in keeping with the Amateur Radio Code. Yes, we can disagree with one another, and we can do it in a respectful and courteous way.

I launched the VA3XPR repeater in 2004 with the intended purposes of creating a community of users where we are all accepting & respectful of one another, as stated on the VA3XPR website. In 2012, VA3XPR was switched to DMR and a huge, vibrant community of

enthusiastic users formed. Unfortunately, the repeater, like others in the GTA, is now plagued by nefarious jamming activity. So, after careful consideration, I decided to take VA3XPR off the air on November 12th and it will remain so until this nefarious activity ceases. If this activity continues unabated on other repeaters, VA3XPR will remain permanently off the air. While it saddens me to do this, I refuse to maintain a system which does little more than operate as a playground for nefarious users and only serves as source of embarrassment for our local ham radio community.

Industry, Science and Economic Development Canada (ISEDC) formerly Industry Canada - expects the ham radio community to be selfpolicing thus, I am appealing to each of you for your help and support. We cannot allow this to type of behavior to continue to obstruct our use and enjoyment of these important repeaters, so I ask each and every one of you for your help in resolving this issue. The users responsible for this nefarious activity are well known by the local ham community. so I ask that each of you encourage all of these individuals to reconsider their ways and to refrain from disrupting our communications. Let's not let a small number of bad apples ruin this great hobby for the rest of us. I truly believe that if we work together, we can make this hobby fun, rewarding and enjoyable for everyone.

News from the Halifax ATS: April 2018

The Halifax Auxiliary Telecommunications Service, or Halifax ATS, is an operational vehicle through which HARC contributes to emergency telecommunications when a man-made or natural disaster strikes our community. This service is a joint effort of amateur radio clubs in the Halifax region and functions under the direction of the Halifax Emergency Management Office (EMO).

NEWS: I am back from two months in Mexico! During my time away, I did not write my regular HATS column, but with this issue of the *Reflector* I am again picking up the thread. While I was away, there were several threats to normal communications from extreme winter storms, particularly a series of strong *Nor'easters*. However, these did not turn into full blown emergencies.

On 1 March Erica Fleck assumed the position as HRM's Division Chief for Emergency Management, replacing Barry Manuel who has now retired. There is a story about Erica and her impressive qualifications elsewhere in this edition of the *Reflector*. We welcome her leadership & vision and look forward to working with her in continuing to build a strong emergency management capability in this region.

On 15 March a meeting was held to discuss an improved mode of operating in emergency situations. This involves designating a qualified Com-A leader to serve daily as the Duty Officer and lead contact with

EMO. This will be a more efficient and reliable structure to support emergency activation by EMO than in the past. This requires a strong pool of qualified Com-A members. At the meeting, there was an excellent expression of interest in performing this role from 7 or 8 Halifax ATS members. If you were not there and wish to be considered, let Tom Caithness or I know.

The HARC monthly meeting on Wednesday 18 April will feature Bob Robichaud, VE1MBR, who is a meteorologist with Environment Canada. He will give us a very relevant Primer on Weather and CanWarn! Don't miss this meeting. An invitation for us to demonstrate Amateur Radio at Scott Manor House, a Bedford heritage property and museum, resulted in us broadening the idea to combine a public awareness event and a training exercise. During our 6 - 8 July event, we will use the opportunity to test our Halifax ATS communications networks and practise passing messages. We will be looking for other opportunities to simulate a field operation and to raise public awareness about amateur radio and emergency communications.

Payment Options ... In addition to mailing a cheque to the Club mailing address along with the application form, or paying at the February Club meeting, we have set up a new electronic money transfer process as outlined below:

Procedure for Paying HARC Membership Dues by electronic money transfer:

Since fewer and fewer of our members use cheques, it is becoming more difficult for some to pay their HARC dues, requiring that they come to a meeting and pay with cash. That is fine for some but for others who are for what ever reason unable to attend meetings it is a problem. However, we now have a system set up to allow HARC members to pay their 2016 membership dues using electronic money transfer. The procedure to use is as follows:

- 1) Send an email to Jim Calvesbert, VE1PPA, our Membership Chair'man at jim.calvesbert@gmail.com and cc: Jim Guilford our Treasurer at jimguilford@gmail.com... with either a scanned or photo of your 2018 Membership Application Form; or, if there are no changes, simply email with your full name and callsign saying no changes; ALSO indicate that you are paying by e-money transfer.
- 2) Go to your on-line banking site and send an e-money transfer to our Treasurer (Jim Guilford) jimguilford@gmail. com. Be sure to include in that email the security question that Jim will need to then make an electronic transfer into our HARC bank account.
- 3) Once Jim Guilford receives the money and has deposited it to the HARC account, he will confirm with you by email and he will cc: to Jim Calvesbert.
- 4) Jim Calvesbert will then issue a 2018 e-Membership Card (by email) confirming that your 2018 membership has been paid.
