

Vanished airwoman Amelia Earhart's haunting final distress calls revealed by Jimmy McCloskey, July 2018

The haunting final distress calls of vanished airwoman Amelia Earhart have been pieced together for the first time.

Aviation expert Richard Gillespie says the emergency signals – many of which were accidentally picked up by ham radio users – offer the most complete picture ever put together of Earhart's final days.

Hours after Earhart disappeared during her round-theworld trip, she is believed to have radio'ed 'Plane down on an uncharted island. Small, uninhabited,' adding that the aircraft was 'Part on land, part in water.'

The July 2, 1937 transmission is only believed to have been heard by Texas housewife Mabel Larremore while scanning her home radio. Larremore listened as Earhart told how her navigator Fred Noonan had been seriously injured and was in need of medical assistance.

Shortly after, the airwoman was picked up by a listener on the island of Nauru in the Central Pacific commenting that she saw 'a ship in sight ahead,' followed by several transmissions that were too weak to hear.

The next day, another housewife, Nina Paxton, from Ashton in Kentucky heard Earhart say: 'KHAQQ (Earhart's call signal) calling...down in ocean...on or near little island at a point hear...'Earhart continued, saying 'Our plane out of gas. Water all around. Very dark. Will have to get out of here. Can't stay here long.'

Paxton waited a week before telling her local newspaper what she had heard.

On July 4 16 year-old Dana Randolph, from Wyoming, heard Earhart say 'This is Amelia Earhart. Ship is on a reef south of the equator.'

Earhart began to give her location, but the transmission faded before she could finish what she was saying.

Multiple indecipherable transmissions were then heard, before Howard Coons in San Francisco heard a voice Gillespie believes to be Earhart saying: 'Still alive. Better hurry. Tell husband all right.'

Another amateur, Betty Klenk of St. Petersburg in Florida heard Earhart radio on Monday July 5 pleading for help to deal with her injured navigator, whose behavior had become 'irrational.'

Earhart's harrowing final message was heard the next day

by Thelma Lovelace in St. John, New Brunswick, when she said: 'Can you read me? 'Can you read me? This is Amelia Earhart. This is Amelia Earhart. Please come in.'

Tragically, Earhart was never found, although researchers said earlier this year that bones found on Gardner Island the next year 'likely' belong to the pioneering airwoman

She gave her latitude and longitude, which Lovelace wrote down, then added: 'We have taken in water, my navigator is badly hurt. We are in need of medical care and must have help; we can't hold on much longer.'

Gillespie, who is executive director of The International Group for Historic Aircraft Recovery, has conducted exhaustive research into the credibility of the transmissions. He has republished his findings on what would have been Earhart's 121st birthday.

He believes that almost all are highly likely to be genuine, and says the transmissions aligns for the pattern of low and high tides over the same period.

The author speculates that Earhart only transmitted when the tide was out for fear of flooding the engine of her Lockheed Electra 10E with water, and cutting off her only contact with the outside world.

Earhart, the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic, had just 7,000 miles left of the 22,000 mile journey when she vanished after taking off from Lae Airport in Papua New Guinea.

Minutes of the HARC Monthly General Meeting 21 NOV 2018

President Jerry VE1JHF called meeting to order at 1840 hours.

Dick VE1AI gave a report on Jack VE1ZZ. Jack was very well known, #2 in the world in 160m country confirmations.

For his 160m transmitting antenna, Jack had 4 - 90 ft high towers, with an extensive ground radial field installed on the sloping hillside. The towers were phased so he could steer the signal in the intended direction. Jack ran radials under the road, through a culvert, and out into the salt water bay.

There was a story about some workers from the phone company who one day showed up on Jack's property to take down abandoned poles and wire. He offered them \$100 to leave it up and go home... they did! Story goes the line ran a long distance, (Antigonish!) and made a great receiving antenna! He did all his own tower work and cabling. He never drove home without the back of his truck full of used wire and hardline. Need-lesstoo-say, ZZ had a BIG signal on 160, and usually the first signal to be heard by many DXpeditions, even into the Indian Ocean. Jack was very well known in the DX community.

It was rumoured Jack ran a lot of power...the lights would dim in the community when he hit the key.....

Jack wanted to run a receive antenna in another direction on his son's property, a couple of lots over, but the neighbour in between was not cooperative. So Jack, being resourceful, ran his coax down to the road, through the culvert, buried it along the beach to another culvert that came out near his son's property, passed the coax through and onto his son's property and finally to the new antenna! He will be missed.

There is a tribute to Jack VE1ZZ by Jeff Briggs, on the Atlantic Amateur website. There is a CTV interview of Jack from years ago on YouTube.

QUARREL OVER DX ENDS IN KILLING

Husband Shoots Wife Who Spoils His Dials, Set for Distance

ST. LOUIS, Mo. — The deadly DX claimed its first fatality in America here the night of April 3 when Mrs. Eleanor Huber, 26, was shot and killed by her husband, Fred Huber, 30 years old.

Instead of going out for the evening, the Huber's had decided to remain at home and listen to the offerings of their Radio. All started well and both were happy until Huber conceived that the weather conditions were good for trying distant stations. Mrs. Huber had her heart set on a program announced by a local station.

Huber sat at the dials and after long and continued manipulation broke through a fog of interference and brought in a station, which from its location on the dials he believed to be coming from the Pacific coast. While waiting for the announcer's verification through the call letters, Mrs. Huber is said to have suddenly given the dials a twist that lost the station.

Instantly Huber flew into a seething rage. Bitter words were exchanged. Livid with anger the man finally rushed for a revolver, seized it and turned it on his wife with a shot that caused her death a few moments later.

He was arrested and will stand trial for murder.

HATS NEWS: January 2019

The Halifax Auxiliary Telecommunications Service (HATS) is an operational vehicle through which HARC and DARC contribute to emergency telecommunications when a manmade or natural disaster strikes our community. This service is a joint effort of amateur radio clubs in the Halifax region and functions under the direction of the Emergency Management Division of Halifax Regional Fire & Emergency (HRFE)

NEWS: Happy New Year! 2018 was a successful year for HATS but, of course, there is always more to be done! Many plans are in the works for 2019.

For many years I have spent a couple of months in Mexico. This year will be no different: I leave on 21 January and return on 26 March. With this in mind, we are setting up several activities for January, February and March that will maintain our momentum.

First, we have scheduled a HATS General Meeting for 9 January with the intent of holding a meeting every four months, hence, the next ones will be in May and September. This is a schedule we will try to retain. Our program this time will feature Karen Saulnier who is also involved with HRFE, but with a new Joint Emergency Management (JEM) unit. She will talk about Personal Preparedness: Your Own 72-hour Kit. An agenda for that meeting will be sent around in shortly

Second, we will start the winter training season with Neil Hughes' Winlink Systems Course on Saturday, 12 January. We are working on following-up with a Net Controller's Course on Saturday, 16 February, but this is not yet confirmed. We are also planning a that we hope to run from the Maritime Museum of the Atlantic. We will give you further information about the latter two events when we are able to confirm the necessary arrangements.

Third, we all need to keep in mind that an emergency can arise at any time and, therefore, each of us should develop a plan for being ready for the unexpected. element of surprise could also come from an emergency simulation exercise.

Finally, I am in the process of making sure other able-bodied hands will be on deck to look after HATS details while I am away. In general, a part of our readiness is developing breadth and depth in our leadership structure. For example, we need to develop our training capacity and the capacity of many members to take responsibility for various HATS functions, including organizing and leading Field Exercises.
