HARC plans to mark the 100th anniversary of the Halifax Explosion with a special event

On December 6, 1917 the ammunition ship *Mont Blanc* collided with the ship *Imo* in the Halifax Harbour Narrows, caught fire, and exploded. It was the largest man-made explosion before the atomic bomb, and destroyed much of Halifax, killing about 2000 people.

For the centennial of this catastrophe HARC is planning to obtain a special callsign, probably CK100VDA, and activate it for 9 days, centred on the exact centennial date, December 6, 2017. All current HARC members will be able to use this call. Why CK100VDA? Of course the 100 because it's the centennial, and VDA because the researches of Spud Roscoe (VE1BC) strongly suggest that the first radio report of the catastrophe was sent by operator George Harris from the radio office of the HMCS Niobe (radio call VDA) a few minutes after the explosion.

Further details of this special call event will be announced as December approaches.

The current membership dues for Full HARC membership is \$25 and has been so since 2005 when it was raised by \$5 from \$20.

In 2013 the Halifax Club, at the urging of our NSARA Director because of increased fiscal pressure on NSARA and declining NSARA membership, agreed to collect the \$5 NSARA membership dues from each of the full HARC members and to pass that on directly to NSARA at the end of our fiscal year. Moved by Howard (VE1DHD) HARC Secretary and seconded by Jim (VE1JG) HARC Treasurer, that the Halifax Club no longer collect dues on behalf of NSARA but that the HARC make an annual donation to NSARA.


I will say 73 for now and hope you will attend the club meeting as Dave Goodwin, VE9CB, Atlantic RAC Director is our guest speaker.





HF & VHF radios were supplied



by the HARC along with the appropriate antennas, operators and the club trailer.

The beam was not able to be used due power lines on two sides of the position. Vertical and wire dipole were used with a dua1 band vertical for VHF. Operators for the week were Tom, VE1GTC; Dick, VE1AI; Doug, VE1LDL Andy, VE3XAD.



There were 38 logged contacts over the four days using HF, SSB, HFCW and VHF-FM. Many contacts were on VHF with local hams who took time to talk to the youth. Two IRLP contacts were made in Great Britain.

News from the Halifax ATS

The Halifax Auxiliary Telecommunications Service, or Halifax ATS, is an operational vehicle through which HARC contributes to emergency telecommunications when a manmade or natural disaster strikes our community. This service is a joint effort of amateur radio clubs in the Halifax region and functions under the direction of the Halifax Emergency Management Office

(EMO)

NEWS: A very significant event is unfolding right now: Hurricane Irma has just delivered major blows to the Caribbean and US East Coast, and it may reach us and causing danger for public safety and communications. Hurricanes Jose and Katie are gathering force right behind Irma. How vulnerable our communications infrastructure actually can be was demonstrated in early August when construction crews severed the main fibre telecommunications cable in Ouebec. Service was quickly rerouted to the secondary line without incident. However, the next day and before the primary line was repaired, the secondary fibre line was also severed in an unrelated incident in northern New Brunswick. With both the primary and secondary lines out of service, this now disabled a major part of the phone system in the Maritimes, including the 911 services! This also included tower to tower communications on the provincial TMR radio system. Fortunately, the outage lasted only about six hours, but during that time the Halifax ATS responded to a call Halifax from EMOcommunications back-up services and was quickly positioned to provide communications if needed. Maybe next time, it will not be just a "close call!"

I gave an interview on Radio News 95.7 on 14 August to correct the impression held by some in the community that everyone was caught unprepared. We were ready and the system worked!

In August, with a significant effort by David George, VE1AJP, we completed an HRM funded project to design and assembly two emergency communications go-kits. They will be on display at the September HARC meeting.

Gary Murphy, VA1GGM who has worked as a First Responder is joining the ATS Steering Committee with special responsibility for Public Relations.

The June monthly meeting of the Halifax Amateur Radio Club was declared open at 20:32 hrs with Don (VE1DTR) in the Chair.

Self Introductions: There were 23 members present.

Motion to approve the May monthly meeting minutes as published in the June 2017 edition of the HARC Reflector was made by Bill (VE1MR); seconded by Scott (VE1QD); Carried.

President's Report: Don had nothing specific to report under this topic.

Treasures report: Jim (VE1JG) presented the Treasurer's report for the month of May 2017. The opening bank balance for 1 May 2017 was \$7,207.23. Total income for the month of May was \$468.50 with expenses of \$459.35. There was one outstanding cheque in the amount of \$300.00, therefore our cash position at the end of the month of May was \$7,216.38. Major upcoming expenses are Club Insurance (\$1,518.00) and \$1,800.00 that is being held in trust for HATS that will be paid out soon. This will then leave the Club with an actual account balance of \$3.898.38. A copy of the full report is appended to the official hard copy of these minutes.

Motion to approve the May report of the Treasurer - Moved by Jim (VE1JG) Seconded by Craig (VE1JMA) Carried.

Executive Reports: There were no other reports from members of the Executive.

Committee/Project Reports:

- Basic Course Tom (VE1GTC) indicated that at this time there is no designated Coordinator for the 2017 Basic Amateur Radio Course; he indicated that he is willing to help out but we need someone to take charge.
- CW Course Report Don (VE1DTR) reported that the course is over but as yet, no one has written the 5 wpm test. He indicated that he was very happy with the distance education approach and will do it again next year.
- **Search and Rescue/EMO** No report
- **Membership** Howard (VE1DHD) indicated that as of this evening, there were 4 Life; 115 Full & 29 Associate members for a total of 148; of the Full and Life members 52 are members of RAC.
- Flea Market Update Marc (VE1BEL) reported on the 2017 Down East Flea Market. A copy of his complete report is appended to the hard copy of these minutes. Marc reported that the overall attendance this year was 219, up a bit from last year, with 65 vendor tables. The net profit for the event was \$742.09. However, Marc also indicated that we need to start planing for next year because we will not have access to the St. Andrew's Centre. As a result we need to look for a suitable facility for 2018. Marc's report made some excellent recommendations that should be acted upon for next year. The membership recognized the hard work & planning of Marc and his team.
- **Field Day Update** Don's Field Day presentation outlined the

planning that has taken place to this point.

- NSARA - Bill (VE1MR) indicated that the NSARA meeting had to be cancelled because of illness in the family of Tom and Shirley Cohoon - NSARA President and Secretary respectively. They are hoping to have either a Director's meeting or picnic later in the summer. Bill indicated that he has been busy maintaining the provincial repeater network. Don asked about the VE1PKT repeater; Bill indicated that VE1PSR is currently his priority but he will get to the VE1PKT repeater as soon as he can.

Old Business:

- St Andrews Move Report Bill (VE1MR) indicated that the West Street Fire Station off of Agricola St. will provide three rooms for HARC when the St. Andrew's Centre is closed. Bill was concerned that this may not be the best option as there is no large meeting room that would handle more than a dozen or so; the largest room would be fine for the Executive meeting, but we would need to rent space for the monthly meetings; parking in this area is also a big problem. Bill hopes that EMO will continue to look for other more suitable space.
- Scout Jamboree July 2017 Tom (VE1GTC) reported on the upcoming Jamboree -July 10 13 and outlined the expectations of HARC in terms of providing radio equipment for the week, as well as designated operators from our Club to oversee the use and operation of the radio station by the Scouts. He requested additional help with setup and takedown, as well as operator/overseers.
- Maritime Museum Bill (VE1WSC) indicated that they are expecting a large group of children at the Museum this coming week and he is currently short of help; he needs

Silent Key

Gary Bartlett - VE1RGB

It is with heavy hearts that we say goodbye to one of the good guys. Gary Bartlett of Wellington, N.S., passed away in hospital on Saturday, July 22, 2017, after a three-year battle with multiple myeloma. He was 73.

Born in St. Stephen, N.B., Gary attended the University of New Brunswick under the Air Force Regular Officer Training Program (ROTP) and graduated in 1967 with a B.Sc. in Electrical Engineering. Later in life, he also earned a certificate in Business Administration from Mount Saint Vincent University in Halifax.

Gary received his training as a Radio Officer in Winnipeg and in 1968 was posted to 405 Squadron in Greenwood, N.S., spending his flying career on his beloved Argus aircraft. Gary went on to postings in Summerside, P.E.I., and finally to Maritime HQ in Halifax. He left the Air Force in 1974 and joined IMP Aerospace, where he worked for more than 40 years before retiring as a Vice-President.

Gary was as smart & funny as he was kind, and was never afraid to speak his mind.

At the age of 12, Gary discovered amateur radio and was immediately hooked. He spent countless hours in the basement of his home, tapping at the Morse Code key. A member of HARC, radio contesting was his passion and he won many awards and recognition from his fellow ham radio enthusiasts.

Gary's love of the outdoors and his strong sense of community led him to volunteer regularly with his local Citizens on Patrol program and the Wayerley Ground Search & Rescue

Donations can be made to the local chapter of the Multiple Myeloma Association.

What happens to a Silent Key's Amateur Radio Operator Certificate?

Unless someone notifies the Amateur Radio Service Centre at Industry Canada, now known as Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada (ISED), so that the deceased ham's call sign can be deleted from the database, absolutely nothing happens and the callsign remains active until the SK's 125th birthday. This then begs the question as to how many of the Radio Amateur callsigns in the ISED database belong to SKs.

While the families of some Radio Amateurs are aware of the importance of cancelling the callsign of a deceased family member, I suspect that the vast majority are not. I would therefore suggest that all Radio Amateurs should, as a matter of course, instruct their families in a formal way as to how to cancel their callsign on their death. The best way to do this is to include a directive in our wills to the effect that the executor needs to contact the Amateur Radio Service Centre in Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada to report the passing of a licensed Radio Amateur; a copy of the deceased's obituary is required as confirmation.

The recent visit of tall ships to Halifax reminded me of when they visited in 1984. Some of the vessels had been involved in a race from Bermuda on their

way here. The sailing ship Margues capsized during the race resulting in one death and 18 missing. Here is a link to the New York Times chronicle of that event:

The Polish vessel Smuga Cienia spotted the distress signals and broadcast a general alarm which was picked up by the Polish schooner Zawisza Czarny who came to the rescue of the survivors.

When the Smuga Cienia arrived in Halifax they only had sail power as they had suffered a broken propeller shaft. The radio that they used to broadcast the distress call had also broken down. A local marine engineering firm was called in to repair the propeller shaft but they could not afford the radio repairs. My boss at the time who was involved in the organization of the tall ships visit asked if anyone would be interested in having a look at the radio. I volunteered.

The radio was designed and built in Russia but except for covering the HF marine bands, could have come from the Amateur Radio Handbook. The technology was familiar to me as I was using it in my own homebrew gear.

Notes on the schematic were in Russian. The radio operator did not know Russian and very little English. However, despite that and being interrupted by the guys doing the propeller shaft repairs we disassembled the radio on the galley table and were able to affect repairs. We communicated by pointing to the schematic and observing readings on my milliammeter.

I was thanked with a cup of the strongest coffee I have ever had and got out of the way of the propeller shaft repairs. I presume they were able to sail safely home in the comfort that their radio was working should they need it but I don't see any sign of where the ship is now despite online searches.



Bayers Road community centre coming down

The Halifax Regional Municiaplity is set to knock down and replace the St. Andrew's Community Centre at 6955 Bayers Rd.

The municipality recently published a request for proposals for a new centre on the same spot as the current one — a popular hub that hosts everything from classes introducing a range of kids to sports, to seniors' meetings and language courses for new Canadians.

The tender says the centre, which employs three people full-time and works with 33 volunteers, sits inside a former school built 61 years ago. The tender says a 2010 report advised against renovation, recommending re-

Online research indicates the current facility will be demolished around next June, with a new centre open by autumn 2019 — suggesting a closure period well in excess of a year.

Proposals are due Aug. 24.

Radio Amateurs in Atlantic Canada Go on Standby During Telephone Outage 08/09/2017

Atlantic Canada authorities called on Amateur Radio operators in parts of Nova Scotia on August 4, in the wake of a telephone service outage. According to the CBC, Bell Aliant landline and cell services were down, starting at approximately 11:20 AM. Telus, Virgin, and Koodo users were also affected. Jeremy Fowler, VE1JHF, a member of the Halifax Amateur Radio Club, said he and other members of his group were put

on standby to help the municipality cope with any communication problems.

"[A] bunch of us pulled out our gear and were on the air, ready to go, cars loaded up," he told CBC. "At that point, everything was kind of coming online, so they told us to stand down."

Martin Swinimer, VE1KLR, expressed surprise that emergency services didn't try to contact him to assist with communications. He and Chris Vessey VY2CRV, in Charlottetown, PEI, said they were

on stand-by as well.

Vessey told the CBC that the phone outage might serve as a wake-up call, and he'd like the public to be better educated on how ham radio works, in the event of another phone outage or emergency situation. The outage was blamed on damage to two optical fiber lines and even emergency responders across the region experienced some disruption in connectivity.
